The Halton Nurses have been seeking for more than a year to have the county bargain with them as a group rather than as individuals. The county has maintained that the nurses' association must be certified under the Ontario Labor Relations Act before the county will recognize it as a bargaining unit.

A previous meeting a week ago, with the same committee, had raised hopes of an early settlement, but this meeting, "was a complete reversal" in the words of the nurses.

With the breakdown of negotiations, the nurses now plan to ask for the support of the R.N.A.O. and of the fifteen Associations similar to the Health Association.

"If other nurses apply for our jobs the R.N.A.O. will tell them it is gray-listed," said Mrs. Hesson.
