The 1st Ranger Company from Norval are going to canvass all the homes in that community. These are just a few of the people and organizations assisting in this appeal.

All these good people are representative of the type of citizen who will be working for Y-M-Y-WCA interests during this Annual Maintenance Campaign.

Actually, these people are working for a triple cause. They are seeking support for worthy purposes that are not only local, but also national and world-wide.
