The boys were two of one hundred and three scouts from Ontario and Quebec selected as representatives of Canadian Scouting. At the same time 137 British Scouts Scouts were touring Canada.

Between them they saw most of the famous sights in south of England. While staying at Maidstone Camp, Brian visited Canterbury Cathedral, the white Cliffs of Dover, and Dover castle. He was taken on a tour of the city and met the mayor.

The two boys met just once when they assembled at Baden-Powell House, where they were assigned their billets.

In London, Brian watched the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace, sat in the House of Commons and passed 10 Downing Street. The third week he stayed in Devon, where he sailed in the harbour and tramped the moors.

Robert Tarzwell went first to Plymouth, then to Robin Hood's famed Nottingham. They camped in that area for a week.

He took in all the sights such as Windsor Castle, the Tower of London, the famous Crown Jewels and the Parliament Buildings. It seemed the highlight of his trip was the piling up of a dinghy near the Cliffs of Dover.

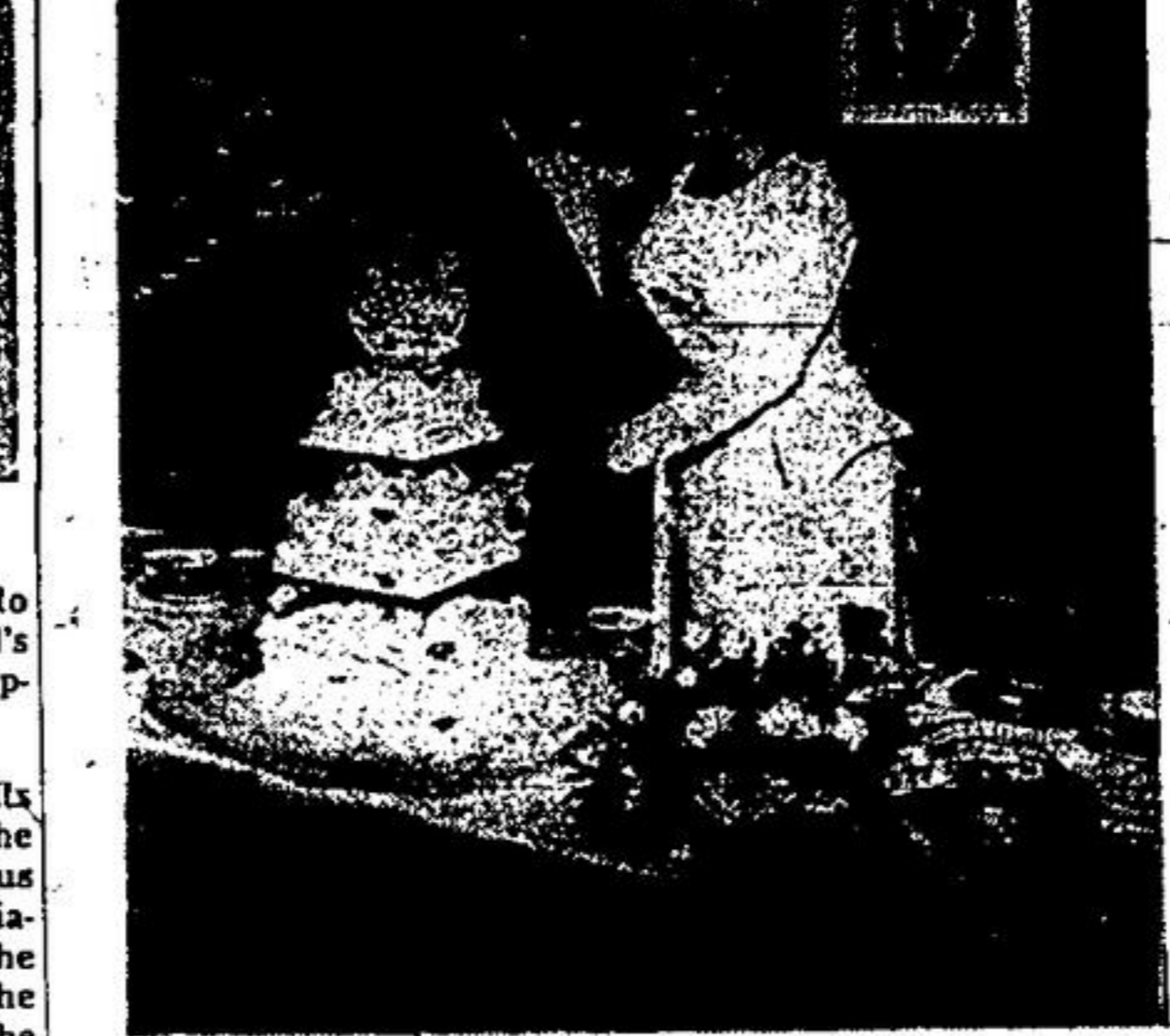

We regret Mrs. Stuart Hall is still a patient in Georgetown Hospital and her many friends wish her a speedy recovery.

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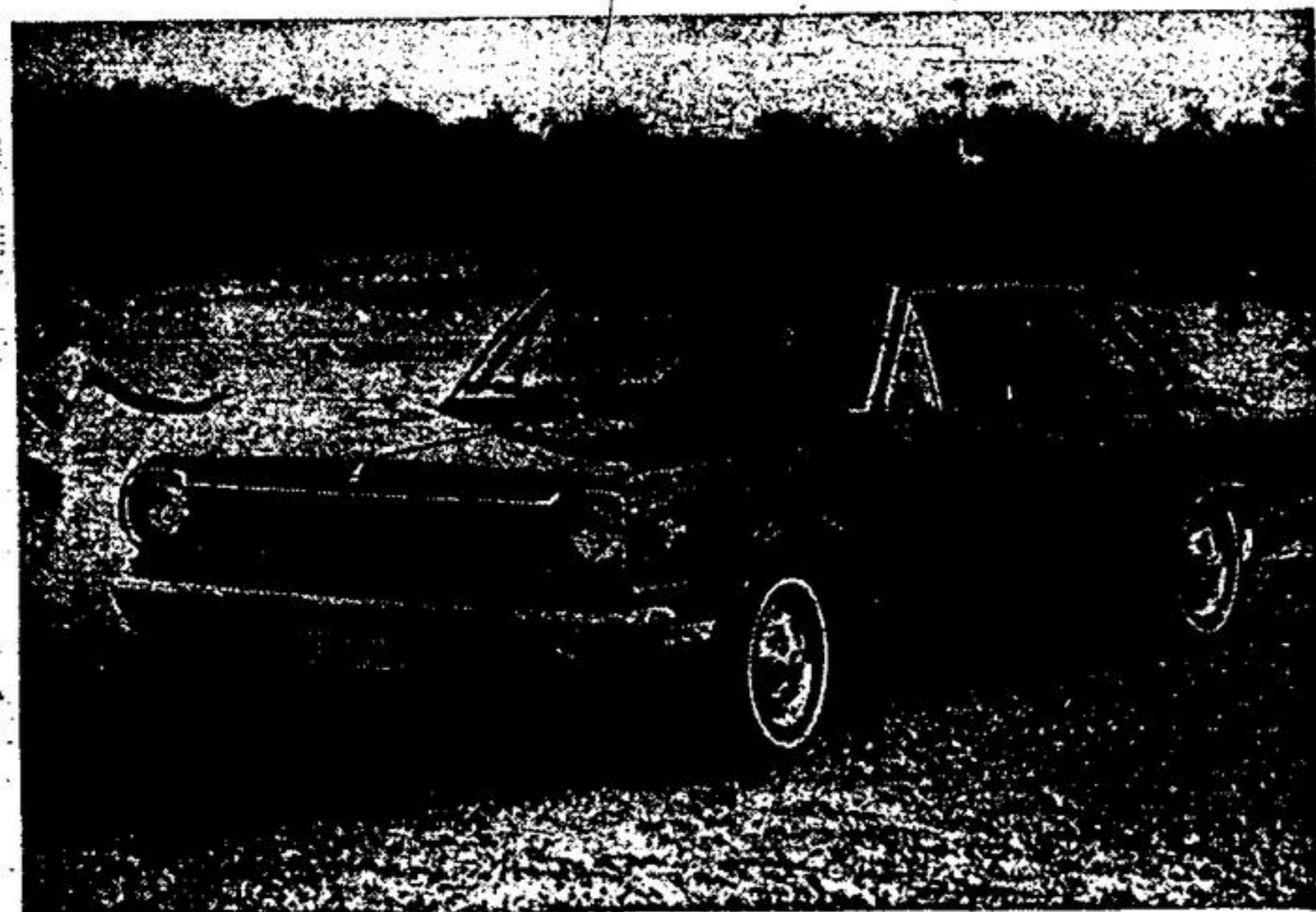
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
