I would like to talk about the 'Stayman' or 'Two Club' conven tion, but before I do, we had better have a look at responses to no trump bids.

If your partner opens the bidding with one no trump, a bid of a suit at the two level is a weak bid. Now most bridge players who don't play duplicate or haven't played outside their own group, don't realize this. The players think that they are playing Goren or Cuthbertson, but they are not.

Both of these great bridge South authorities recommend the weak two response to an opening bid of one no trump.

Such a response is a rescue bid, designed to get the partnership out of a poor no trump contract into a suit contract at a low level. This two level response should be made only if you have less than six points own devices, North would proband a five card or longer suit.




