Herkes Refurbishes Lauder Car, Bound for Hollywood

A former Georgetown garage operator Scotty Herkes has a very special car in his garage this week — the magnificent Rolls Royce which carried its famous owner, the late Sir Harry Lauder over more than 200,000 miles.

"Keep right on to the end of the road," is a song the great Scottish Entertainer made popular many years ago, and though Sir Harry has long since reached the end of his road the 1929 Rolls has not.

"Scotty" Herkes, has the car in his Brampton service station. He is re-wiring it as part of a \$2,000 facelift which will put it back in its original showroom condition.

How it came from Scotland is quite a story.

After Sir Harry's death it was owned by Scottish comedian Johnny Victory.

Ralph Harding, owner of Arc Records in Toronto, saw the car in Glasgow last year when he went over to negotiate a company of Scottish entertainers for a visit to Canada.

A friend of Johnny Victory, Dennis Clancy is also a friend of Mr. Herkes.

"If you want it fare-lifted properly take it to Scotty" said Mr. Clancy.

Mr. Harding did, and the work is under way.

The car brought back a million memories for Mr. Herkes who recalls seeing the car in the late 1930's standing outside the stage door of the Empire Theatre in Edinburgh.

"Never dared touch it in those days," he said. "It was like a royal car. Now here I am putting it back into condition again."

Not that the car, entirely hand-crafted, needs much attention. Its major change will be Mr. Herkes work of putting 12-volt wiring in place of the present six-volt and 12 coats of paint in the Rolls Royce tradition.

"If you got in right now it would take you right around the world without any trouble," said Mr. Herkes.

The Rolls Royce will "keep right on to the end of the road" in true Lauder style.

His next journey is to Hollywood where Danny Kaye will drive it in the film of Sir Harry Lauder's life to be made this winter.

"I've been thrilled to have it here," said Mr. Herkes. "It'll be a sad day when it goes."
