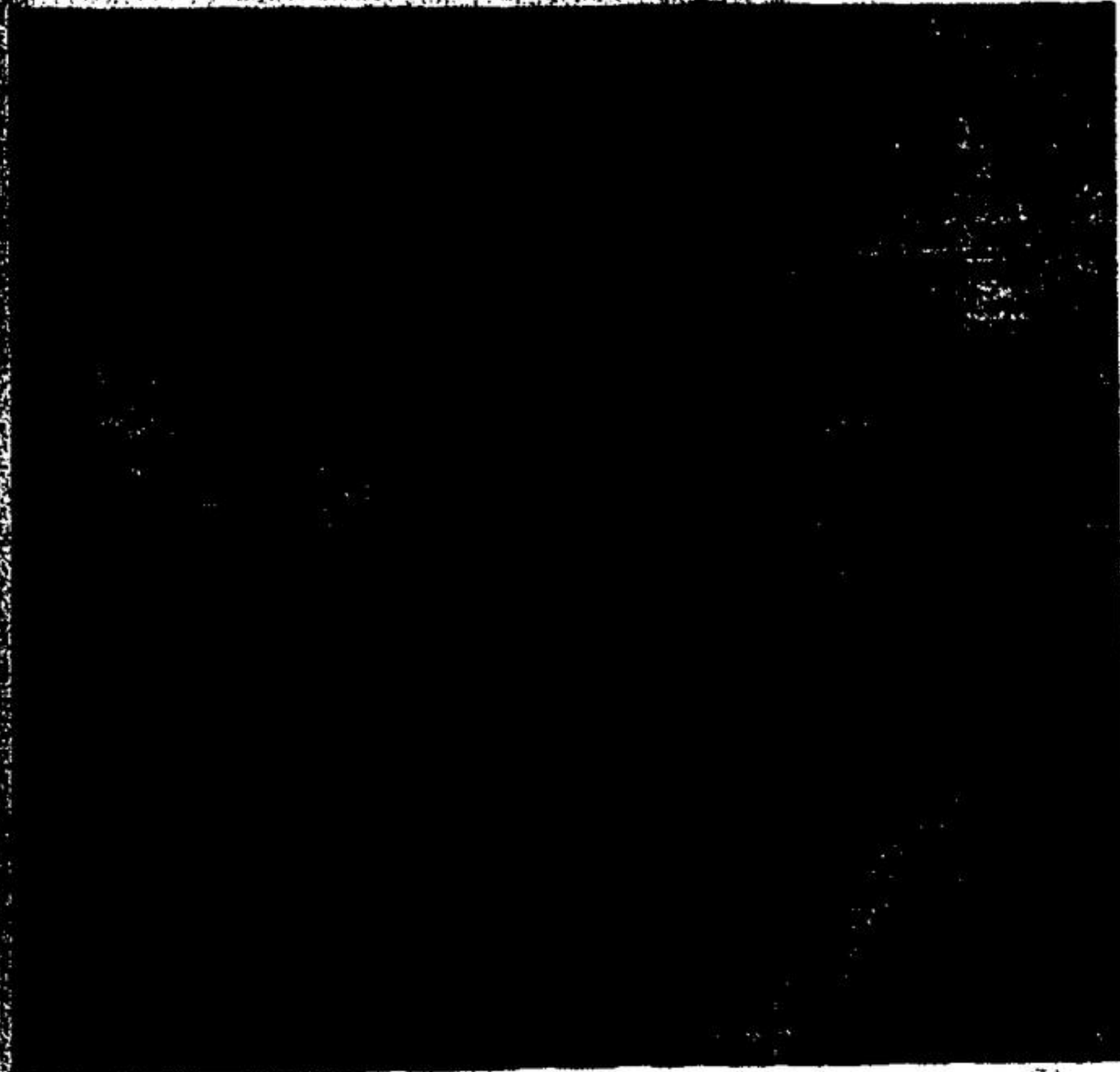


Eager Buyers Grab Bargains At Businesswomen's Sale
