Raiders Uncork Hockey Season With Week-Exhibition Games

Some of the mystery surrounding the comparative strength of the newly constructed Oakville Blades will be erased Friday night when the Georgetown Raiders open a two-game pre-season exhibition schedule in Oakville arena. Both teams will do their jousting this year in the OHA's six-team Suburban Junior C loop.

Raiders have been around for three seasons, but the Oakville crew is fresh from the oven. Friday's meeting will be their first test.

Raiders, who copped the OHA Central Junior C League pennant this past spring, face a tougher test here Sunday afternoon when they host the muscular Weston Dukes of the Metro Junior B league. Dukes have already played twice, impressing both times with an upset over West Clair, the Ontario Jr. B runners-up, and a tie against Clinton Comets of the Eastern Amateur League.

General consensus of rail birds watching the Raiders hone their edge at the practice sessions is that this edition may be even more solid than the one that brought honours home.

Returnees working out between the pipes are Tommy Ayres and Tom Quinn, while Russ Hartley and Rod Presswood have returned to their blue line posts.

The front lines will bear a strong resemblance to last season's with Bill Dwyer, Paul Robinson, Terry Lane, Ron Lane, Don Norton and Bob Allen back in the fold.

Most of the added strength is in the good crop of the new comers. Proven juniors are Jim Blair and Phil Lavell who are working out at rearguard, plus Al Arnold up from the Juveniles and Bob Smith a Fergus native who played briefly with Raiders at the start of last year.

Standouts in the crop of forward hopefuls are Terry Hay, a Juvenile who has played a good share of games in Junior Juveniles, Ron Stewart, a good garb, Danny Arbie from Acton local player, who sat out last season as well as several Brampton Juveniles including Rick Maloney, a late cut last fall.
