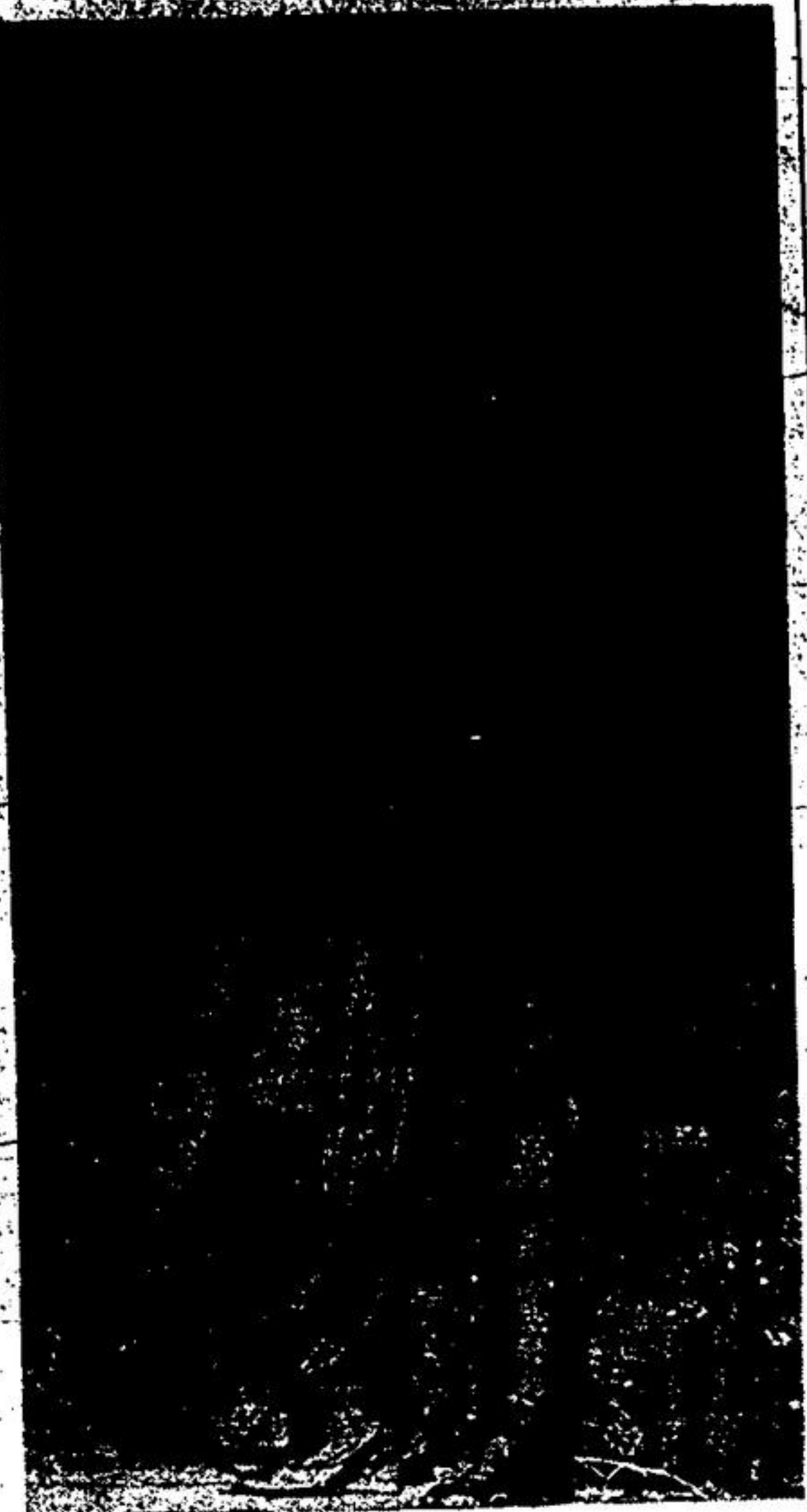


**ANCIENT KYOTO GODDESS

**Six March On Police Office
"What Stupid Nonsense": Black**

Six Georgetown youths protesting at the arrest of a friend marched on the Municipal Building shouting and banging on doors, a court was told Wednesday.

Georgetown Police Constable Jason Field said the disturbance broke out when he and another officer arrested a man in a downtown restaurant, August 12.

The six protesting youths followed the police to the police station calls shouting and complaining.

They refused to move from the scene, the officer said. Then Inspector Harley Lowe came from the police station and again told them to leave, and warned them they might be charged with causing a public disturbance.

"What stupid nonsense," he commented on their behaviour.

He found the sixth man involved in the disturbance was the cause of all the trouble and fined him \$50, or ten days.

He told the youths, "If you feel there are some fancied wrongs there are proper ways to bring your thoughts or suggestions forward."

A total of eight other charges against the youths involving assault, obstructing police, and holding an unlawful assembly were withdrawn by the Crown.

Magistrate James Black reserved judgement on five youths for six months telling them that the charges would most likely be dismissed if they stayed out of trouble in the meantime.

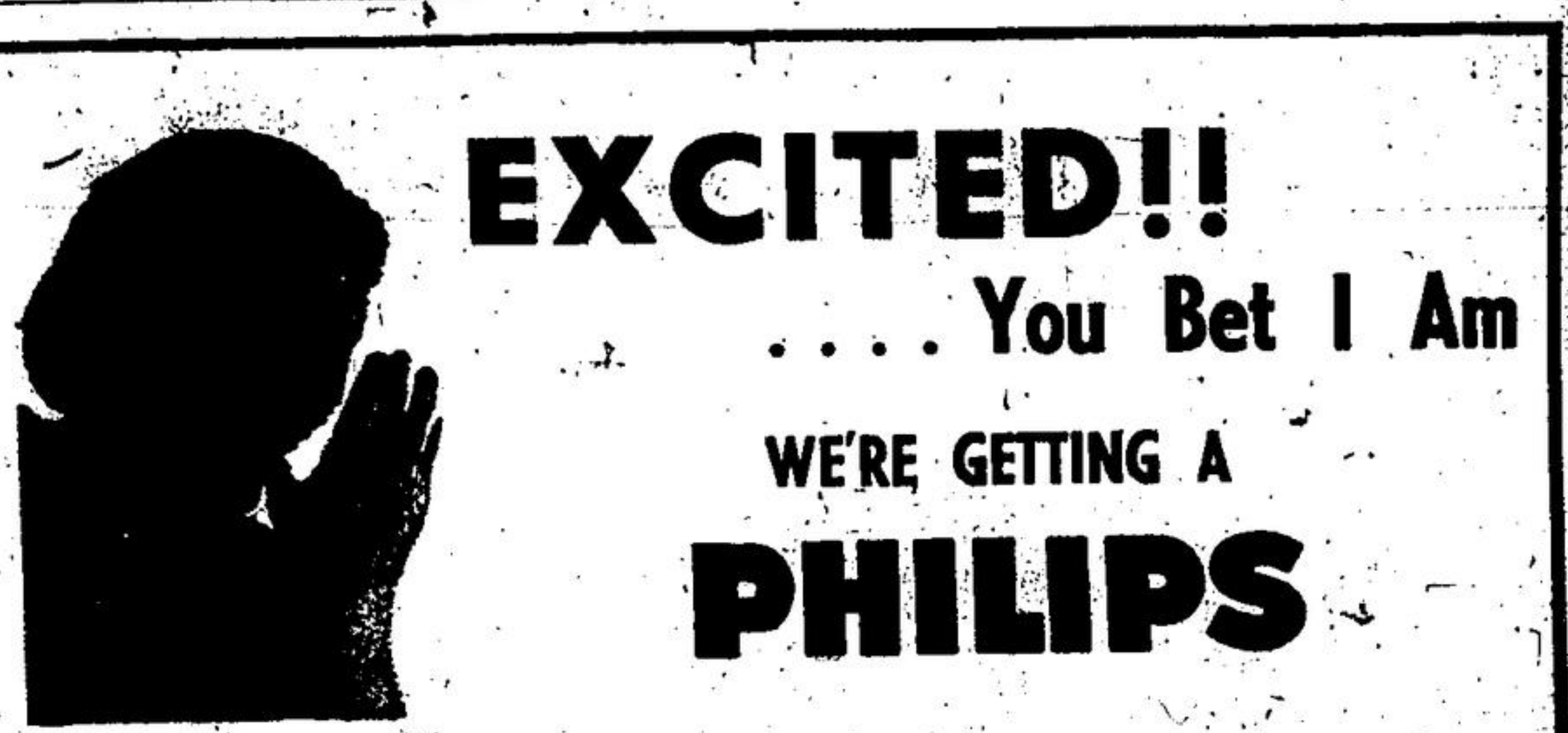

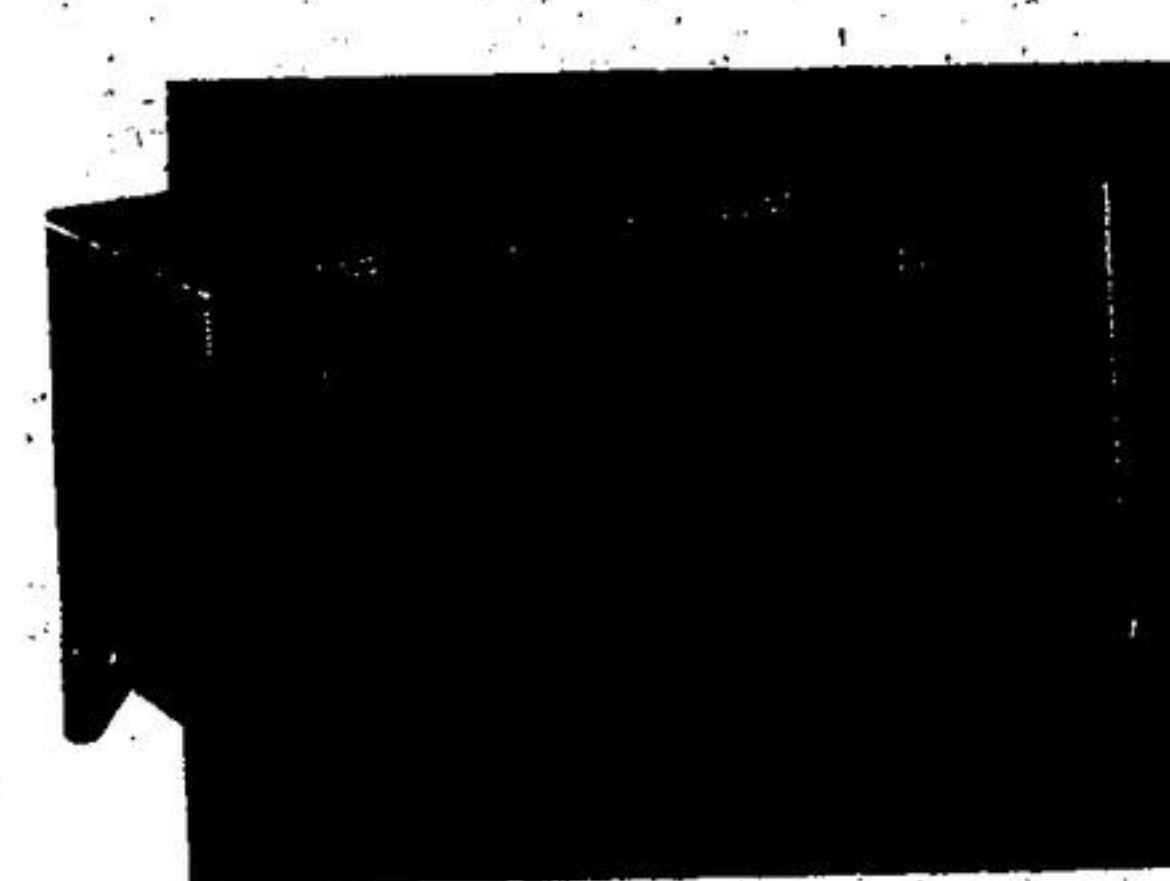
