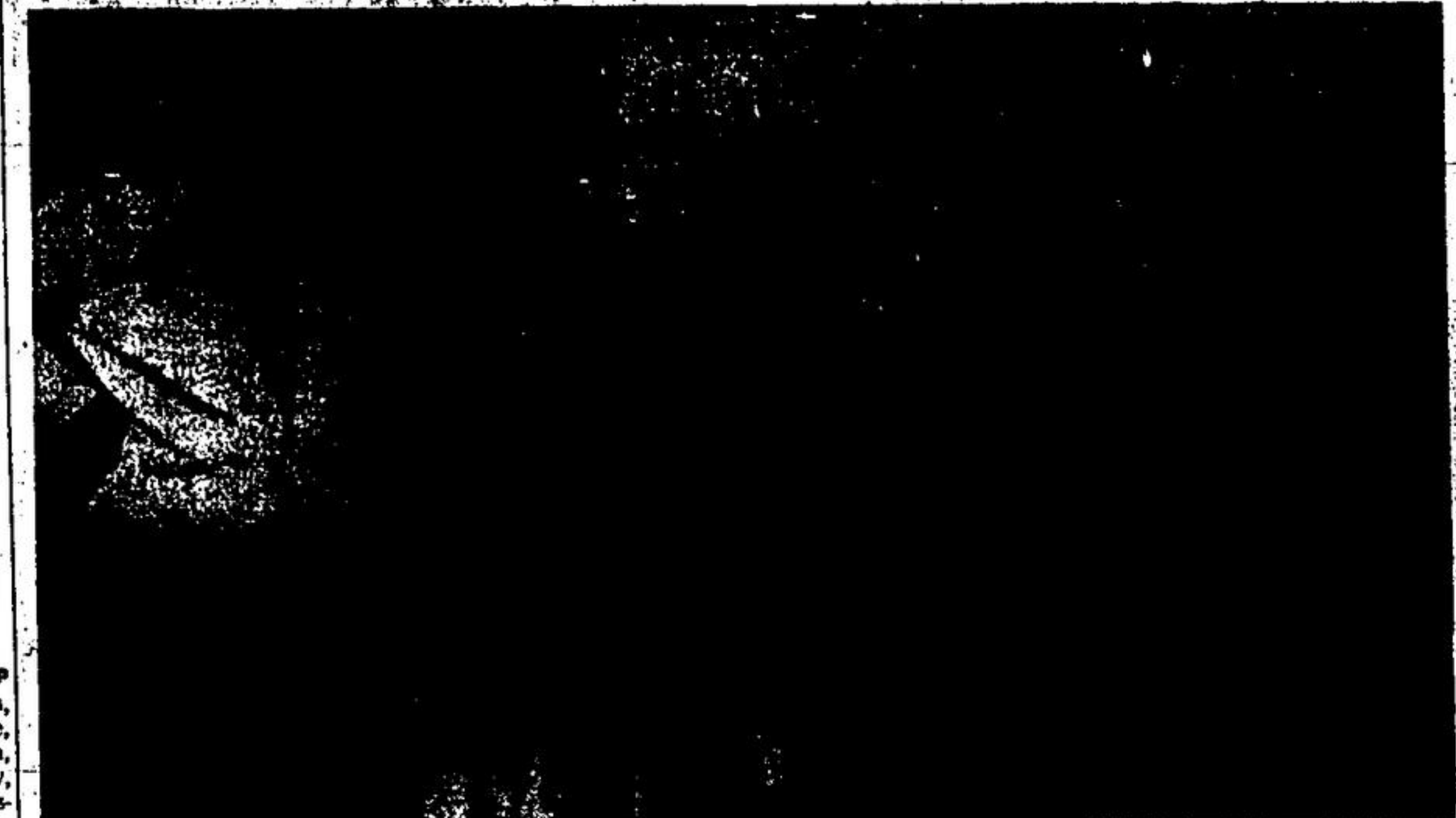

## Rebs Suffer First Loss Have Second Chance Friday

Victory was so close they could smell it, but the taste in the mouths of the Georgetown high school senior footballers at the final gun Oct. 14 was defeat.

GDHS' red and blue Rebels, who have been romping for first downs almost at will while going undefeated through the first 4 games of the CWOSA District 10 League schedule failed to get one when they needed it most in Guelph and their charmed life ended on the five yard line of the John F. Ross Collegiate. A goal line stand by the John F. Ross defensive wall preserved a 14-9 lead and that club's unblemished record.

Both Georgetown and Guelph entered the game with identical four wins, no loss records, and tie for first place.

Good defensive play by both teams was the feature of the first half. Georgetown scored first and went ahead 3-0 when an offensive drive bogged down in John Ross territory. On third down, Fred Cowbrough hit the uprights for a 25 yard field goal. Late in the second quarter the Royals threatened offensively for the first time. They moved the ball successfully with a series of ground plays and eventually cracked over for the touchdown on the last play of the half. The convert was

good and the half ended with John Ross leading 7-3.

In the third quarter John Ross added a second touchdown when they completed a 25 yard pass play into the Georgetown end zone. The convert in the final quarter of play the Georgetown defense cut off John Ross completely and the offense began to move the ball well. Quarterback Bill Dwyer engineered a well-balanced attack which carried the ball to the Ross 8 yard line. Stan Kynersley took a hand-off from Dwyer and ran a reverse around the left end for a touchdown. The convert was missed and Georgetown trailed by 5 points with 4 minutes remaining.

Shortly after the kick-off the Georgetown defense forced John Ross to punt on third down. Another offensive drive from mid-field, which featured good blocking and fine running by Doug Hills and Don Parsons, carried the ball to the Ross five yard line. The Ross defense tightened and held on third down and the hard fought game ended with John Ross ahead by less than an unconverted touchdown.

A return match with John Ross is scheduled for Friday, October 28th, at the local park.
