

Six Points Friday Mean Championship for Rebels

In a game marred by frequent penalties, Georgetown Senior Rebels defeated Milton on Friday, 24-0 in preparation for their big John F. Ross game tomorrow.

Georgetown struck quickly, when on a second down and inches to go, Bill Dwyer satisfied the armchair quarterbacks and hit Brian Peavoy with a thirty yard pass, which Brian carried another thirty for the score. The conquest was blocked.

One of Georgetown's best plays of the day, after a Milton punt, was the cause of another score. Milton quick-kicked from their own twenty, and, behind excellent blocking, Stan Kynnersley returned the punt fifty yards for a touchdown, converted on a Dwyer pass to Wayne Turnbull.

On two other occasions, Georgetown backs, Hills and Kynnersley, carried Milton punts back for scores only to have them nullified by penalties.

Milton made some gains thru the Georgetown line, but when pressed, the Rebels were able to stop them with alert defensive play.

Other scorers for Georgetown were Barry Cock and Lynn Mackenzie, both on passes from Bill Dwyer. Fred Cowbrough was good on one conversion.

Georgetown must defeat J. F. Ross by six points to take the league title in tomorrow's tussle in Georgetown Park.

Rookies Dazzle Young Blades as Raiders Pass First Test

Georgetown Raiders management were pleased two ways in Oakville Friday night when the locals took the highly-rated Oakville Blades by a 7-5 count in their first pre-season exhibition game. To win was reassuring, but to have all Raider goals scored by new acquisitions was evidence of a strengthened club.

Rick Maloney, an early season but last year, scored three goals and assisted on two others; Terry Hay, elevated from Juvenile to play part of last season, fired a pair of goals and set up three; Jim Blair notched a goal and an assist, and Ron Stewart, who sat out last season scored once.

Oakville Blades were stung with three quick goals in the first period and then fought back to narrow the gap to one goal on three occasions before they grudgingly surrendered the decision to Georgetown.

Georgetown led 3-2 at the end of the first period, and 5-4 at the end of the second frame.

Tom Ayres in the Raider goal was the man of the hour in the third period as Georgetown ran into a string of penalties that allowed Oakville Blades several chances to erase the difference.

But while Maloney was the offensive story for Raiders, former Juvenile star Greg McCauley proved the pleasant surprise for Blades coach Jack Rogers as he banged in three goals and assisted on another by defenseman Tony Evershed.

Former Dixie Beehive Bruce Baker notched the other Oakville goal in the first period.

Some 300 fans had barely settled in their seats when the Raiders poured three goals past Blade netminder Don McCaffrey, two on rebounds and the third on a pretty passing play that Hay finished off with Maloney and Blair.

Baker and McCauley put the Oakville club back in the game before the period ran out.

In the middle period Oakville twice narrowed the margin to one goal only to have Georgetown widen it to two again each time.

A scrap between Phil Levell of Georgetown and John Kemp of the Blades broke out behind the net and several other players joined in before referee Pete Kemp and linesman Ed Butler could separate them. Two Raiders, Paul Robinson, and Ron Lane, and one Blade, Brian Gregg, got game misconducts for joining the fight.

Late in the third period Raider Don Norton drew a match penalty after being tagged with a two minute minor.

Oakville had a man advantage for the final six minutes of the game only to pull off several big stops to keep them off the score sheet. Raiders alternated Ayres with Tom Quinn.

Nix Open Deer Season For Hunters in Halton

Halton will have no open deer season this year, despite a plea at Halton County Council last week, that the previous decision be revoked.

Council stuck by the recommendation from the agricultural committee for no deer season this year.

Deputy Reeve R. Rogers objected to the cancellation pointing to a high birth rate in the deer population. He claimed that Halton was the only county in the area not having a hunt. Later in the meeting Georgetown Reeve W. Hunter stated Peel County was not having a deer season this year.

Committee Chairman Reeve W. Hunter noted firing guns below the Dundas Highway, so the hunters were forced into the northern part of the county.

Reeve H. Merry opposed the open season. He called Council's attention to damage resulting from the hunt in Esquesing and Naasagawya. Then the hunters can come back south of the Dundas Hwy. where their property is protected by the "no-firearms by-law."

Deputy Reeve W. Hooley suggested the problem was the hunters were not proficient enough to deplete the deer population, and claimed the Department of Lands and Forests would have to find some other method of lessening the deer population.

On a registered vote, opposition to the hunt was registered at 21-11.

Volleyball Juniors Place Second in Competition

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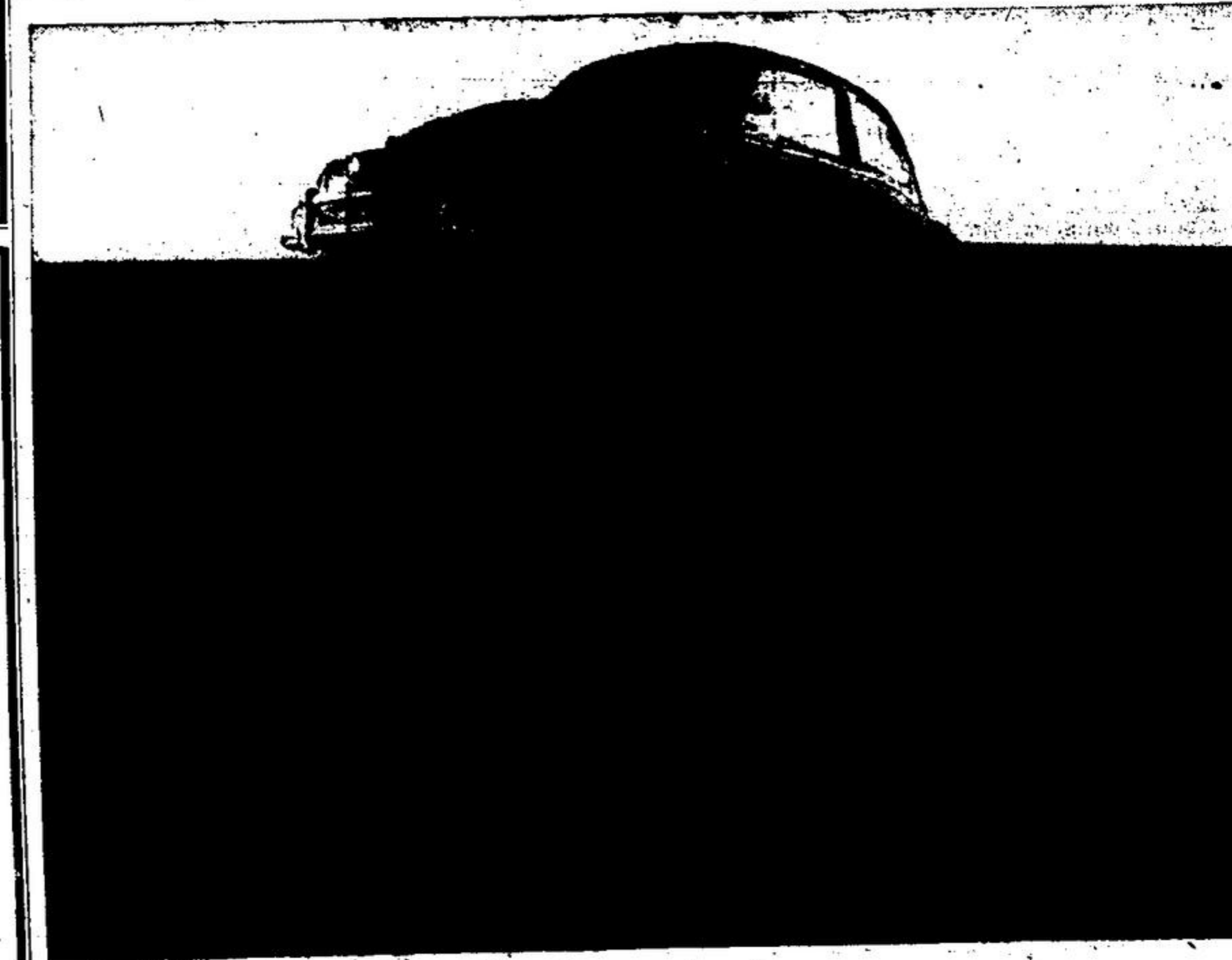
