

Married Mother Of Seven In Georgetown, Found Bigamist

A 37 year old Streetville man was sentenced Wednesday to six months' detention and three months' indefinite for going through a form of marriage in Georgetown with a mother of seven children knowing her husband was alive.

The husband said that a year before the accused went through the marriage rite with his wife in 1964 he had agreed to a divorce if the accused footed the bill.

"But when the accused did not make the first \$50 down payment to the lawyer, I dropped the divorce," the husband told Magistrate James Black.

The husband said he and

his wife were married in Port Credit in 1942. Rev. Ian Fleming of Georgetown said the woman told him she was a widow when he "married" her and the accused in 1964.

The woman testified that she had known the accused for 25 years and that he met her first husband once a week when he called at their Georgetown home to see their seven children.

She said the accused contributed to the children's upkeep. She added that her second marriage lasted only two weeks because the accused wanted to go home to his mother "and I couldn't live with him anyway."

Describes Pakistan Homeland Shows Curios, Handicraft

Mrs. Roland Lobb, a native of Pakistan and a member of the teaching staff of Holy Cross RC Separate School, was introduced to members of Countess of Strathmore Chapter, IODE, at their October meeting by the regent, Miss Margery Mackenzie.

In a most interesting talk she told about the snow and cold in Pakistan, without the luxury of central heating, generally lots of snow and usually a white Christmas. There is no great effort on education for the masses in her country, she said. She was educated by the Grey Ladies of the Anglican Church. Children start school at age 3 and learn English as a second language at age ten.

It is difficult for Christians to make much progress in a land mostly Moslem. Men are allowed four wives and divorce is easily obtained. Moslem wives are treated as chattels, she said, whereas Hindu wives are like jewels in the household. Many women graduate as doctors, and 65 per cent to 70 per cent of these go to England.

Natives of Pakistan are very superstitious, never walk under ladders or break mirrors. 22K gold is worn but never 18K. Mrs. Lobb showed members beautiful clothes from the colourful east and white satin wedding gown embroidered with silver thread was modelled by Mrs. W. MacDonald. She also demonstrated the wearing of a sari, traditional Pakistani dress. Lovely pieces of needlework, which is done by the men, were shown a beautiful tea cosy, hand-made shawls, a native pipe, hoes and currency. Later postcards were handed around for members to view.
