

Manor Building Extension Off Schedule By A Year

The \$1,400,000 building extension project at Halton Centennial Manor has been hit by so many delays that it is almost a year behind schedule.

Manor Administrator Stanley A. Allen said this week "it seems we are depending on luck now to get it finished."

The project involves construction of a new block close to the Manor which is intended to house 300 extra beds.

Strikes early in the year and a number of other problems have frustrated the project with difficulties.

It was due for completion last December but was held up. A new deadline was set for March. That failed. Then June was anticipated as the completion date.

The last deadline was September 30, when an opening ceremony was being officially arranged for the new building.

That has now been by-passed and it looks as if the project may not be completed before the end of the year.

Asked to speculate on the completion date Mr. Allen replied: "I don't ask about that, but I think I know as much as the contractors do, just by looking at it."

"There is at least six weeks work left for some of the trades. The kitchen equipment, I believe, on the site but has not yet been installed."

One bright spot, though: "we have very good working conditions and relations with the staff," Mr. Allen added.

"I am still hoping they may be out of there with the exception of maybe some minor adjustment, by the end of December."

Mr. Allen said he was disappointed that work was not progressing as well as it should be.

Repairs are starting on our roof very shortly. We have had problems with the roof for some little time.

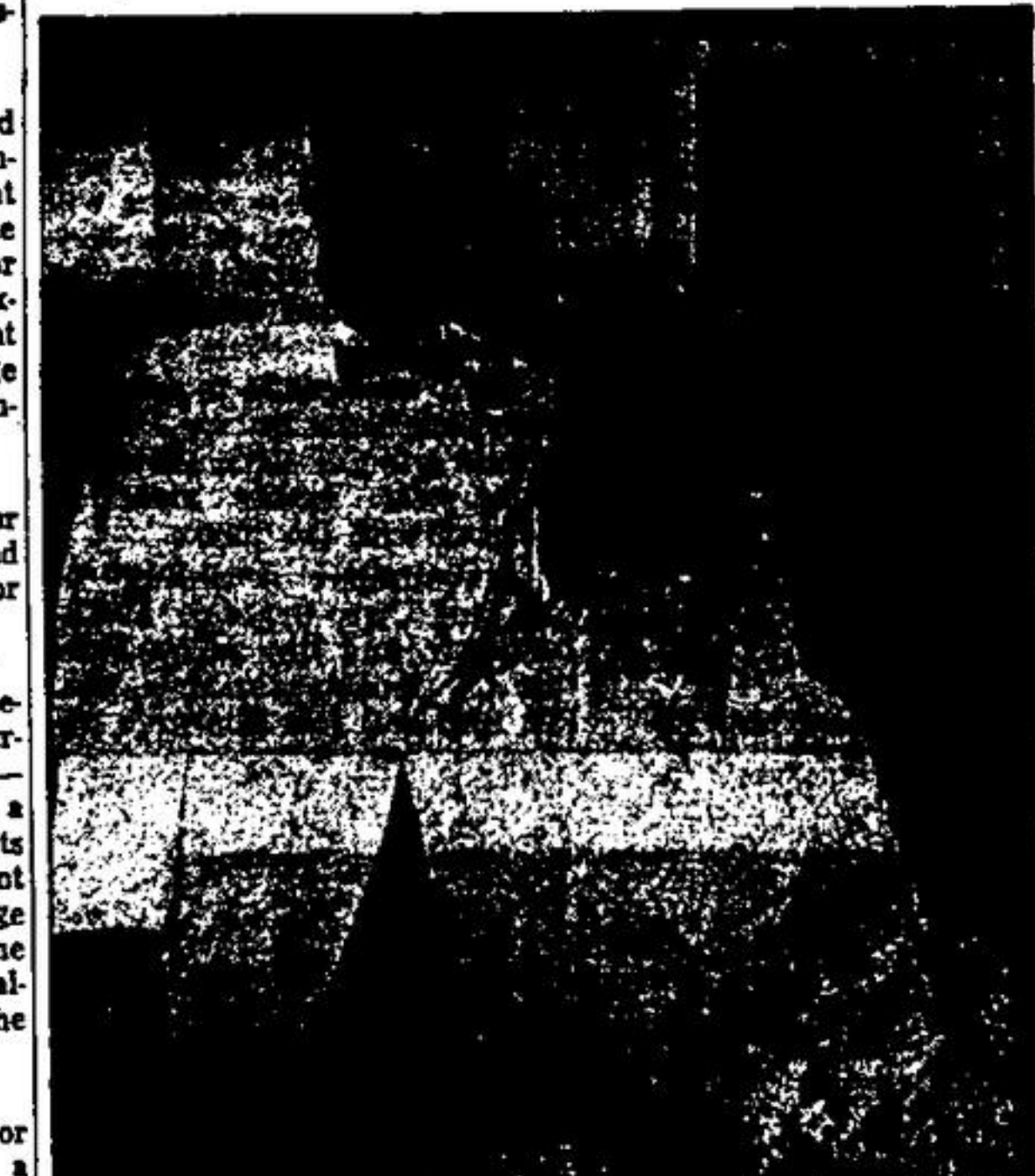
