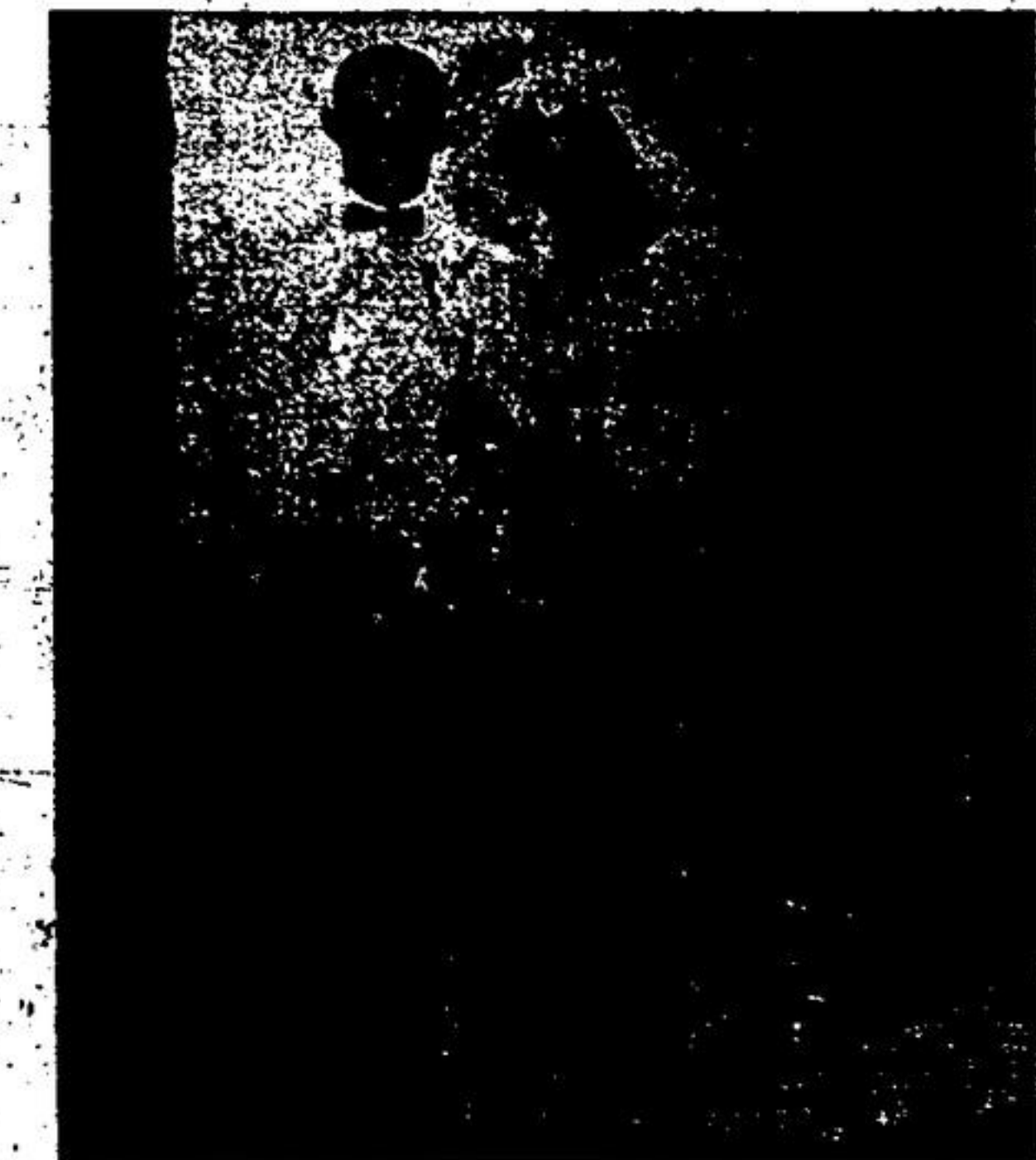

Students Attend Careers Exposition in Kitchener

On Thursday, October 20th the grade XIII students of Georgetown District High School travelled by bus to the 1968 Careers Exposition sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Kitchener-Waterloo. This Exposition was designed to assist students in the planning of their careers and provided an opportunity to talk to well-informed representatives of different vocations and professions.

Upon arriving the students were directed to a room above the display area where they could avail themselves of refreshments while awaiting their turn. Shortly afterward, along with several hundred students from other High Schools, the Georgetown students entered the main area. There, representing approximately forty occupational fields, individual booths had been set up. Many of these people out did themselves in assisting all students in a personal way.

Each booth had been extremely well planned and set-up depicting various aspects of that occupation. In many displays interesting audio-visual material was shown.

A noteworthy factor a credit to those planning and staffing the booths was the availability of printed matter for the students.

Among the fields represented were: Civil Service, Commerce and Finance, Communications, Education, Professions, Trades, Science and Research, Social Agencies and Utilities.

The Guidance Department at Georgetown High School tabulated the results of a questionnaire prepared for the students by the Kitchener-Waterloo Collegiate Guidance Department. This questionnaire attempted to judge the students' reaction to what had been viewed and heard. The results of this inquiry were excellent, indicating all the students profited from and enjoyed the trip. Information on new career choices and added information for those who have already decided on their future course was the desired and obtained result.

The students were accompanied to Kitchener by Mr. Frouse and Mr. Emerson of the Guidance Department, Mr. Meakin of the History Department and Mrs. Finn the School Librarian.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

When everything looks rosy at a contract, that's the time to worry about what might go wrong. I was reminded about this a few weeks ago at the Acton Bridge Club when the following hand occurred. Maybe the board number should have warned us to look out for something (It was Board No. 13). Here is the hand.

Both sides vulnerable.
Dealer - South.

The only bid that requires any comment is West's final double. I think that it was most unwise, for it tipped off declarer to expect trouble. West led his top club and dummy was spread.

Well, everything looked rosy. Four spade tricks, four club tricks, two diamonds, a heart and a heart ruff would add up to a small slam. So what could go wrong?

Well, that double sounded like it had some trump with it and probably the heart king. The heart king is no bother but if West has four trump, declarer must proceed carefully. He could take out trump but then he wouldn't ruff a heart.

Declarer won the club in dummy and leads a low trump. Sure enough, East showed out. Declarer played the king and

West refused the trick by playing low. A low trump is led and the eight is played in dummy.

Now a heart to the ace and a heart is ruffed in dummy. The jack of spades is played and West wins. However, it does not matter what he leads. South can win and take out the last trump.

Even if West wins the second trump and leads a third round declarer can get his heart ruff in and still have an entry to take out West's last trump.

Maybe, just maybe, if West does not double and if declarer does not anticipate trouble, West will make two trump tricks. Declarer may lead a low-spade to dummy and play the jack.

Then West must make a couple of spades. Doubles of slams should not be made if they will help declarer make the contract.
