John F. Ross led 21-0 at half time, and while they found the going rougher in the late quarters still held the red and blue machine pointless while tackling on another 8.

however, Mayor Gibbons wanted the town solicitor to accompany them. This objection was overcome when the councillor insisted the solicitor had nothing to do with a private discussion.

Upon their return, Mr. G. Shaw stated that while he felt a fee of \$1800 would be acceptable, he felt the 50 per cent surcharge had merit since it was fair and consistent, and both men had agreed to recommend the 50 per cent surcharge be accepted by their companies.

Mr. Shaw doubted the legality of a joint bond. He pointed out that either company could be sued for damage to the disposal plant, the same as any other suit. He admitted separate bonds might be possible.

Mr. Crichton pointed out that the effluent had been going into the disposal plant for almost a year, and had done no damage.

The motion setting the 50 per cent surcharge on the water bill, retroactive to January, 1966, and to be reviewed every six months, passed with only the mayor opposing it.

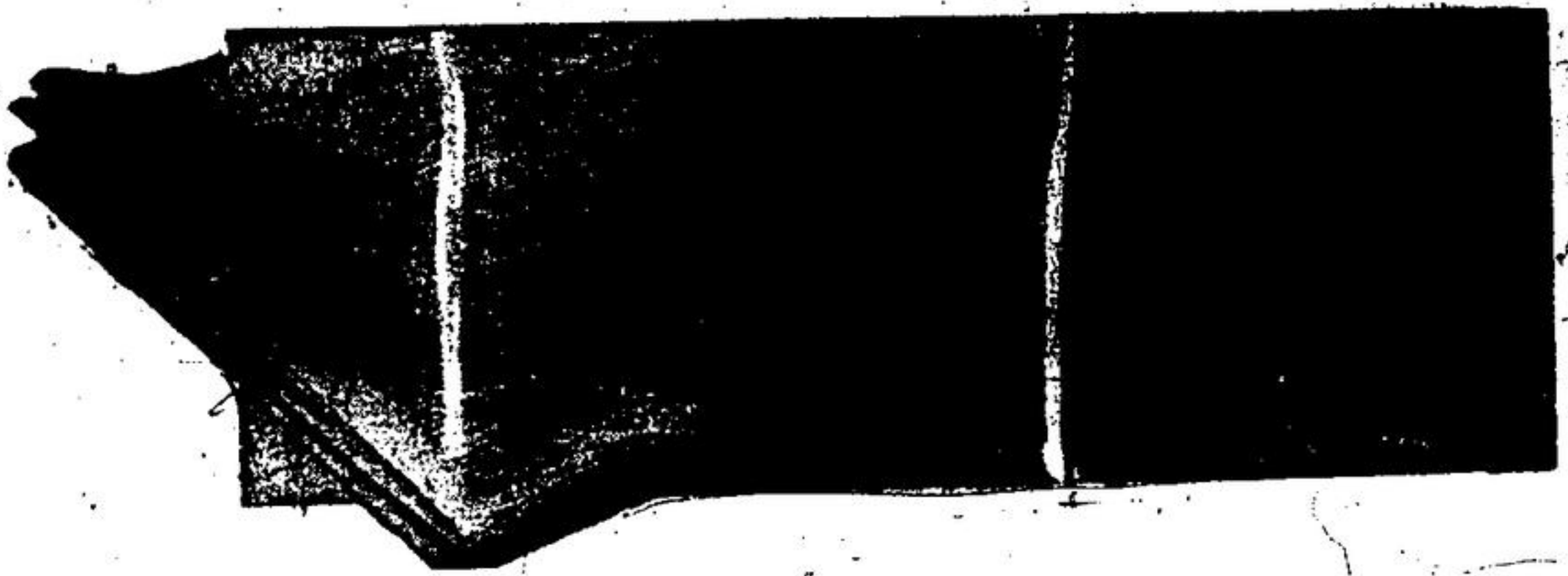
