## Council Can't Agree Second Garbage Truck

Purchase of a second garbage truck, proposed at a Saturday council meeting, was voted on a 5-3 vote after a brief debate.

Cr. Harrison, Hyde and Speight were strong advocates of the purchase which was proposed on a rental agreement of \$150 monthly until next July, and then on a \$450 per hour basis with a guarantee of 40 hours' use weekly.

Cr. Harrison argued that a purchase now would actually save the town \$5,300. Rent of \$2,300 incurred this summer for the vehicle would be as part of the purchase price if a purchase is made, he said, and it will cost \$3,000 to rent the machine again next summer.

Cr. Emerson asked a number of questions which included whether a study had been made of garbage costs under today's municipal system compared with cost of private collection a few years ago.

"I think we're paying a tremendous amount more and I don't think our system is any better or worse than it was before," said Cr. Hyde. "We have brought this on ourselves by constant criticism levelled at private contractors."

Cr. Hyde said the town can't return to a private system at the rates it was paying and is faced with high costs no matter what system is used.

When Cr. Ballentine objected to the purchase, on the grounds that the present garbage truck is only used four days a week, Cr. Hyde said that only if commercial pickups are eliminated can the system operate with one vehicle.

There is one day weekly when two machines are necessary, he said, and the purchase proposal is the best deal available. As for longer work shifts, as Cr. Ballentine proposed, he said the works staff told him in June they couldn't stand longer working hours.

Cr. Smith said the town is going to need a second machine in future and would favour this if it is the best deal but would not vote for it until specific answers are given to Cr. Emerson's questions.

Cr. Harrison said that many of the complaints of garbage on the streets are due to householders putting garbage in improper containers and on the street too early. A plastic bag system could speed pickups and eliminate a share of the litter, he said.

Cr. Harrison said any cost comparison would have to take into account that costs are 30 per cent higher than they were three years ago.

## Delete By-Law Section Governing Older Homes

The controversial section of the Zoning by-law which could have permitted older homes to be converted into apartments was deleted from the by-law at Council meeting Monday night.

Cr. Wheldon Emerson stated he was not convinced that this was the right action. "Do I understand that people wishing to convert a large house to apartments would have to make application to the Planning Board?"

"No, to council," explained Cr. Hyde. "We don't want to work a hardship on anyone."

Cr. Emerson reminded Council that there had been certain amendments suggested and asked why these had not been acceptable.

Cr. Hyde stated that any other method but complete deletion of the clause would give the Planning Board or Council discretionary powers. "The Department frowns on this because it could lead to accusations of favoritism." Now each application will be considered, and if approved, the by-law amended. "The steps would be the same as any amendment to the zoning by-law" stated Cr. Hyde. "The applicant would come to council, we would refer it to the Planning Board for a recommendation or refusal. We still don't have

to accept their word, council has the final say. Then it would go to the Ontario Municipal Board and a meeting would be held, where any objections from neighbours could be aired.

The clause was deleted from the by-law.
