Eye Highway Site For Police Station

Council Prepares Offer to Purchase Armstrong House As Headquarters

With the preparation of an offer of purchase, authorized by council Monday night, the old Armstrong residence at the corner of Maple and Guelph Street, became the likely spot for police headquarters. Cr. Hyde stressed the need for more space for the policemen. He admitted there would have to be more money spent to change the house into offices but felt the location and the solid state of the house, warranted it. Agreeing with Cr. Hyde, Cr. R. Ballentine emphasized that all the renovations would not be done at once. He, too, felt it was a key location. The motion to prepare the offer of purchase to buy the house from RAD Construction at a cost of \$18,000 passed with Reeve Hunter and Cr. Harrison opposed. Cr. F. Harrison questioned the method of financing, while Reeve W. Hunter wanted to know how much land went with the house. Cr. W. Smith and A. Speight were absent from the meeting.

MAYOR ILL IN HOSPITAL

Mayor Joseph Gibbons was admitted to Georgetown District Memorial Hospital Tuesday night suffering an attack attributed to his diabetic condition. A hospital spokesman said yesterday that the Mayor is "doing fairly well". His doctor, Dr. J.H. Chamberlain told the Herald it's expected Mayor Gibbons will be kept in hospital for the balance of the week.

October Accident Toll Includes One Fatality

North Halton detachment Ontario Provincial Police, report 39 accidents occurred during the month of October, causing 1 death, 14 injuries and a total of \$29,130, property damage. This brings the toll for the year to date to 375 accidents, 146 injured, 5 killed, and \$239,736 property damage as a result of accidents in the detachment's territory.

Three Stage Building Promised On Acreage

An offer from Howard Tarzwell to purchase lots 62 and 63 in the town-owned industrial area, was turned over to the property committee on Monday. The offer, made through W. F. Sunnucks Real Estate, stated the cost to be \$8,217. The area would be completely fenced with chain link fencing, and ten thousand square feet of building erected immediately. By 1970 another ten thousand square feet would be built, and by 1972, a further ten thousand square feet. In the end he hoped to have a much larger building but would not commit himself at the present.

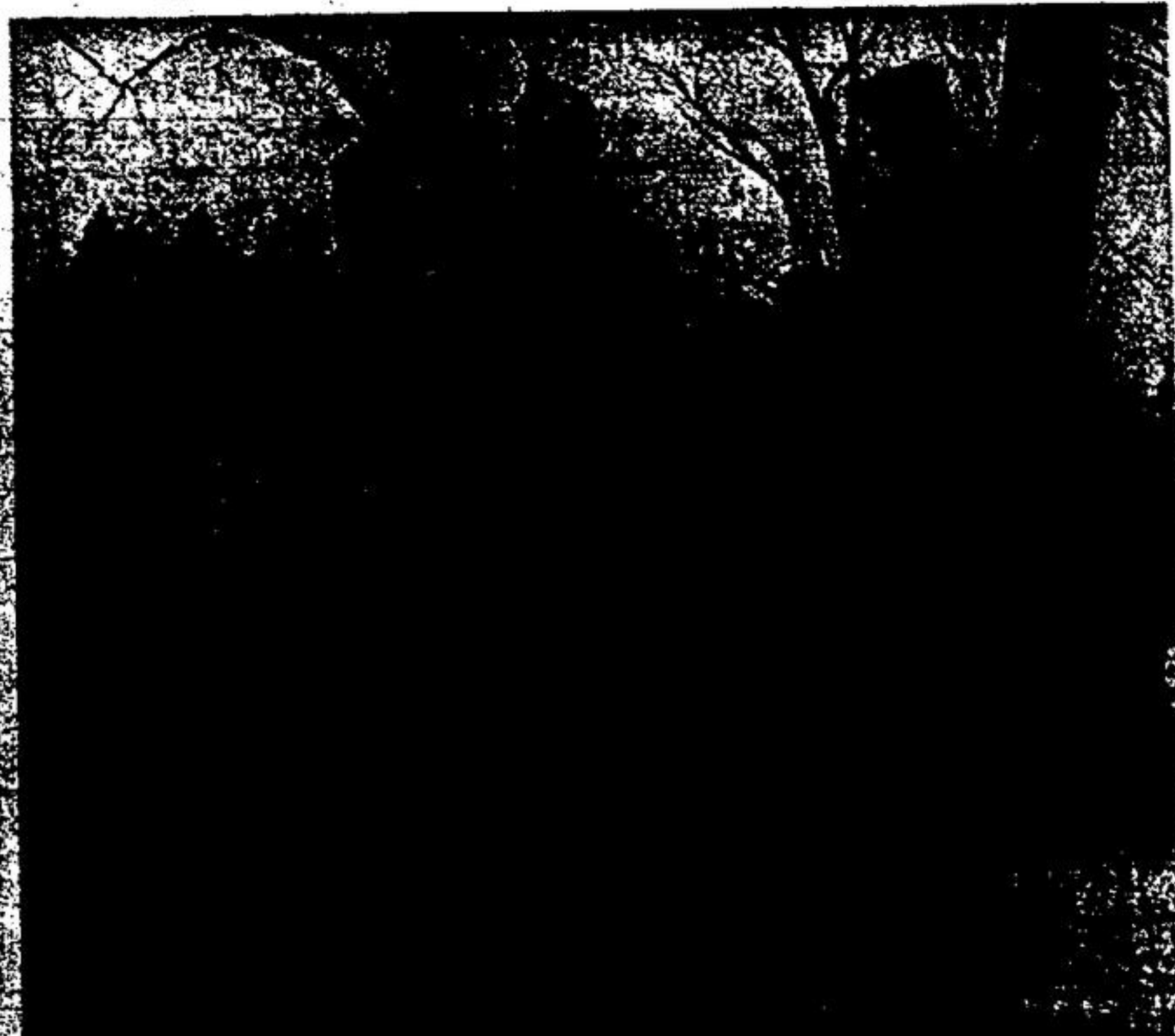
Jim Emmerson First Election Candidate

A Walk On The Bruce Trail Before The Snow Flies



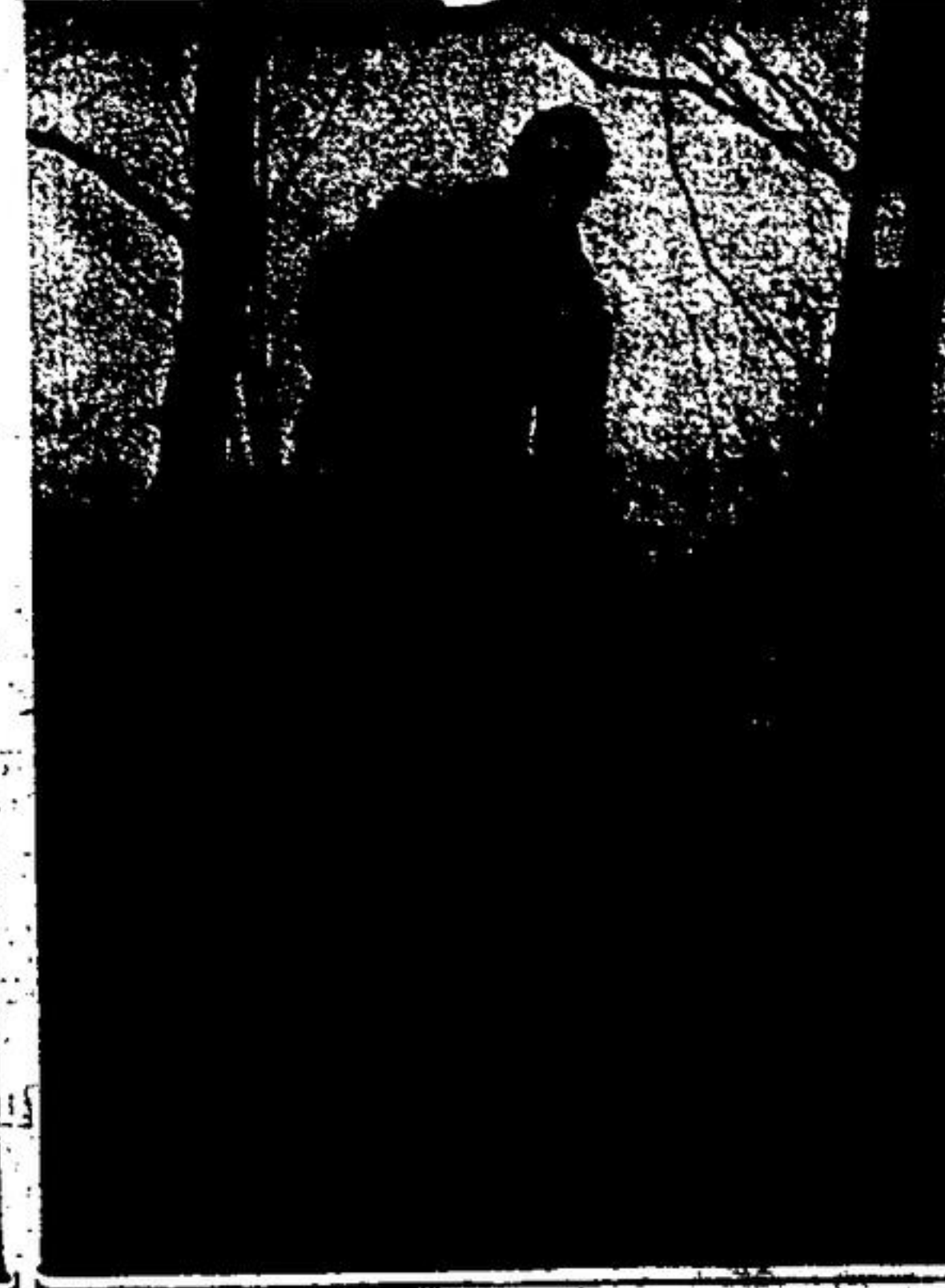

Explains Police Always Available in Emergency

Monday night H. Gunning, Byron St., told council of his surprise upon phoning the police office and being unable to get a policeman. "The phone rang six times then a lady answered. She said she could contact one if necessary." Continuing he demanded, "Am I to understand there are times when there is no policeman on duty?"

Deputy Reeve J. Young, chairman of police, pointed out that they could have been out at an accident, or on the beat, when Mr. Gunning called. He explained that Mrs. Oliver would have called a policeman immediately if it had been an emergency. "When you told her your call was regarding dogs running loose, she would take the message and give it to them when they came in," he concluded.

Mr. Gunning also suggested the dog control by-law was not being enforced properly. In reply Cr. Ballentine stated he had fewer complaints recently than ever.
