**YEAR ON EXCHANGE**

**Teacher Finds Discipline Better Here Than in Schools in England**

"The school in Dartford, Kent, at which I taught for a year, was lax in discipline compared to our schools here," said Charles Pinkerton teacher at Centennial School, who has just returned from a year in Britain as an exchange teacher. This was only one of the surprise statements he made in discussing his year abroad.

He claimed that talking and smiling down corridors in bunches was commonplace.

Among other differences from our system are the yearly report card and yearly examination. There is only one of each. The examination is standardized throughout the borough. Neither are there any "failures". A child does not pass or fail, but is tested and streamed. Then continues at his own speed in his own stream.

While not critical, Mr. Pinkerton doubted the wisdom of the system of streaming children toward their future education at the age of eleven. At this time they are divided into

three streams, one to Grammar School or our equivalent of the university bound academic course, another to Secondary Modern or roughly our vocational course, and a third to a technical school for highly skilled trades.

He felt the setting of their goals at such a tender age inclined to stifle their initiative, and in some cases create an indifferent attitude. However, a child can write qualifying examinations at age thirteen if so desired, but this is the exception.

In explaining his reaction, Mr. Pinkerton told of encouraging the children to discuss their future plans. Only the 'A' stream, or university bound seemed interested, the others said, "What can we do we're going to Secondary Modern or vocational."

The children were disappointed he didn't speak "Canadian", evidently expecting something much different from their own speech. The English children have an excellent knowledge of their own coun-

try, in Mr. Pinkerton's opinion, but not as good a knowledge of other countries as Canadian children.

He taught the same grade at the same school as Miss Marion Prior, who just returned to England after teaching Mr. Pinkerton's grade here. In England he taught music, Physical education, speech and drama to children ranging from four and a half to eleven.

He took advantage of his stay to visit all the well known historical spots in Coventry, Stratford, Oxford, Bath, Brighton, London and Edinburgh.

Crossing the channel he toured Belgium by himself, then later with four other staff members accompanied thirty-one children to Rotterdam, Amsterdam, and the Hague, where they stayed at youth hostels.

"A really enjoyable experience, which broadens the outlook on education," was his summing up of the year's exchange teaching.

Dr. Harry Harley, MP for Halton, told a gathering of Liberals Friday night that he would be running for Halton East in the next general election.

Halton East will be the new riding formed under a Federal redistribution plan.

About 60 Liberals in the Halton east area met at the Hornby Towers Golf Club Friday to form a new association for the area, to adopt a constitution and elect officers.

Under federal redistribution the Halton East riding will consist of townships of Erin and Essex plus Georgetown, Milton and Oakville.

The rest of Halton will join up with parts of Wentworth to form Halton-Wentworth.

At the same time as the federal ridings are being redistributed so are the provincial ridings. Halton has been split up to form east and west Halton and does not extend into Westwood or Erin for the provincial ridings.

At Friday night's meeting the Liberals elected Rev. Robin Stone of Oakville as president; Mrs. Derek Mason, of Oakville, as vice-president; George Jackson of Oakville as secretary and Bill McQueen of Oakville as treasurer.
