

Ewing Street "Green Acres" Cause For Verbal Skirmish

A letter from the Credit Valley Authority advising council that an option on land surrounding the creek at the bottom of the Ewing Street hill tentatively planned for conservation purposes, would expire November 18th, and asking for direction, sparked a donnybrook to use Cr. Wheldon Emerson's words, at Monday's council meeting.

The proposal originated with the 1964 council, and was followed up by the CVCA obtaining an option on the land.

According to the letter the cost would be shared 50% by the Ontario Provincial Government grant, 40% by the town of Georgetown and 10% by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. In dollars the amounts stated are \$11,042 by the province, \$8,834 by the town, and \$2,208 by the CVCA.
