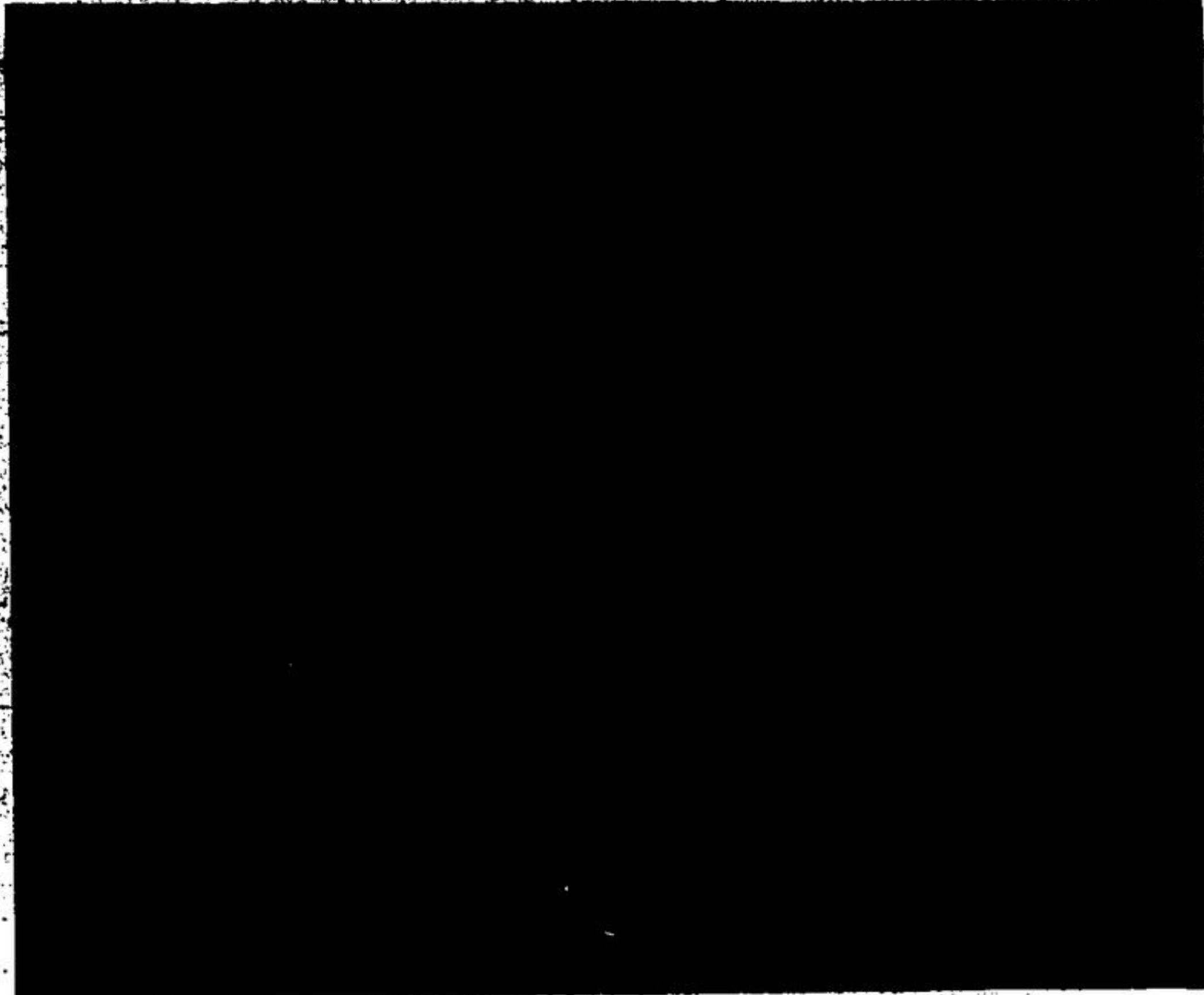


# Excellent Plowing Despite Blustery Weather and Hard Ground

Sixty entries — the largest for the county match since 1955 — braved blustery weather on Sat. Oct. 29 to compete in the annual Halton County Plowing Match.

Many of the top plowmen from Halton County and many other parts of the province competed in what judge Win Timbers of York County described as "the Little International."

Despite sub 50 degree temperatures and biting wind, the contestants successfully battled the "rock-hard ground." Judge Bob Timbers, the second half of the popular father and son judging team, praised the plowboys for their excellent work. In class three for open mounted plows for two or more furrows, he said, "I don't think I've ever seen a class so close, there were only a few points separating first and eighth place."

T.J. Brownridge of Georgetown was judge for the horse show.

# Test Traffic Control Light As School Safety Measure

A new kind of pedestrian-motor traffic control light will appear on Georgetown streets early next year if council and police department approval is given a public school board proposal.

Seeking an alternative to the present Safety Patrol system by which some senior pupils tell their school mates when and when not to cross at selected street corners, the trustees, Wednesday night, favoured a traffic control device offered by the Eagle Signal Division of the E.W. Bliss Co. as a solution.

The unit would display flashing amber or red to the motorist and walk or don't walk to the school children, but would only operate for measured periods of time before 9 a.m., at noon dismissal, before reassembly and at final dismissal.

Trustees said they felt the part time operation would serve two purposes. It would allow motor traffic to proceed unimpeded while school is in and it would tend to make the motorist more aware of the lights while in operation.

The idea came out of a special meeting of the board, with

company representatives, and Chief Constable Roy Haley and Jason Traffic Safety Officer Jason Field two weeks prior to Wednesday's board meeting.

The local manufacturers offered to install one of the units on a trial basis if the board gave them the nod. It would go on Rexway Dr. in front of Harrison Public School.

If at the end of the trial period the board feels the unit is the answer, they will install four or five additional units at: Princess Anne at Charles St.; Shelby St. at Rexway Dr.; at Duncan Dr. at Weber Dr.; and possibly Sims Gate, locations suggested by police.

The school board began seeking a protection system to replace Safety Patrols in September when two of Georgetown's six public schools became junior schools. Trustees said at that time they felt Grade 6 pupils were not old enough to supervise crossing at the hazardous points. Grade six is the senior level at the new junior schools, George Kennedy on Weber Dr. and Harrison on Rexway Dr.

The automated signals would
