## Tight Game as Oaks Defeat Town Midgets

Oakville Merchants proved to be poor hosts Saturday, when they beat Georgetown 3-2, in an exhibition game.

Oakville scored the lone goal in the first period when Don Ferguson took a pass from Larry Kellerborn in front of the net and poked it in.

Georgetown tied it up in the first minute of the second period when Dwayne Hay clicked with a rising shot from the wing, but spoiled that effort when their own player knocked a shot from Terry Ferras into the net, at about the five minute mark.

Oakville fought back at the midway point of the third frame, when Bob Clark rushed the Georgetown defence, followed the puck into the corner then passed it out to Tom Daley who hit from in front of the net.

Merchants' manager Jim King said it was the toughest test so far for Oakville.

Hay who got both goals for Georgetown was the standout skating well and making himself a threat both ways.

Hornets finished seventh last year and were clobbered in the first round of the playoffs against Georgetown. This year they have a brand new executive and are in good financial shape despite an arena that seats just 500.

It was good to see a good number of parents at the arena last Saturday morning to watch the games and feels good to watch the games in comfort with the heating system.

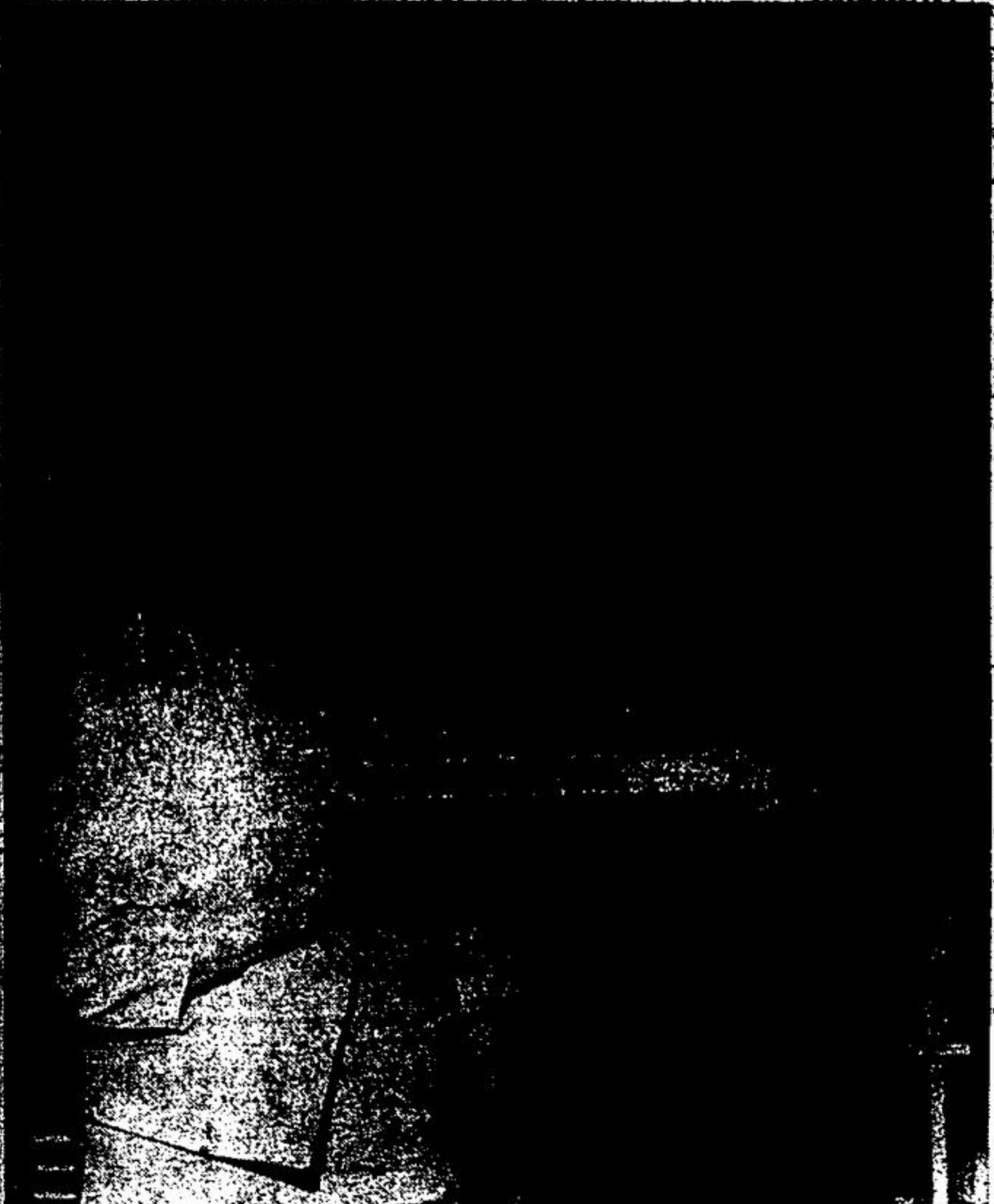

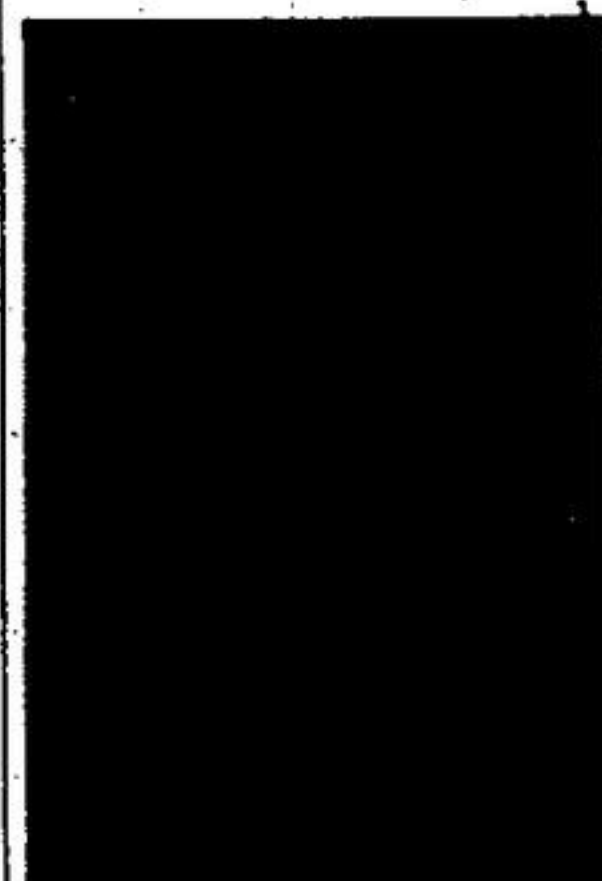
