**School Lunch Hour Supervision: Problem That Won't Go Away**

Lunch hour supervision, that fly that's been bothering in school teachers' soup since the discovery of inclement weather is still there — though another attempt was made at a Georgetown Public School Board meeting Wednesday night to have it removed. An alternative to having teachers spend their lunch hour at school to supervise pupils bringing their lunch in bad weather was proposed by Centennial Public School principal William French representing the six public school principals. It's no secret teachers saddled with the noon hour duty would like to shake it off. However, despite years of trying it's still there. Latest proposals would have the board hire non-teachers to sit with noon lunchers, and while some Trustees expressed agreement Business Administrator James F. Evans indicated it's doubtful such a plan could be legally implemented.

He said a section of the Public School Act infers pupils must be supervised by teaching staff from the time they arrive at school until they leave. "In fairness to those small pupils coming a distance to school, I don't think we can say no when they want to stay at school for lunch during the bad weather," stated Trustee Harry Shortill. "But we should not tell members of the teaching staff they can't have their hour off at noon," he added.

Mr. French said he phoned parents of children who stay at his school on wet days to see if any would be interested in taking on the lunch hour duty and all said they were too busy.

He said he then suggested to his staff that only pupils outside a certain radius of the school could stay at noon hour but that idea didn't find favour. The matter was discussed last year by the board when approximately 40 pupils were making a habit of lunching in a Howard Wrigglesworth Public School room. A rule that no pupils could stay unless authorized by principal William Kinrade was made, and that cut the average number to 15. But it still meant that one of
