

Retired Bank Manager was Active Community Worker

One of Georgetown's most public spirited citizens during his residence here, Gordon Wilson McLintock, 80, died in Georgetown hospital, October 30.

Mr. McLintock had been manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce for 16 years when he retired in 1946.

Born in Kirkcaldy, Scotland he came to Canada as a young man and joined the Bank of Hamilton. He continued with the bank in Hamilton when it was acquired by the Commerce and in 1930 became manager in Georgetown.

In his wide variety of civic interests, he had been an active member of the Lions Club, Esqueving Agricultural Society Curling Club, Red Cross. He was a member of the board of St. John's United Church, and a member of Credit Valley Masonic Lodge. He was one of the organizers of Georgetown Girls Pipe Band. During the war years he was prominent in government bond selling drives.

He leaves his wife, Agnes Coralie Davison, three daughters, Mrs. Hugh Mercer (Margaret) of Markdale, Dorothy of Islington and Mrs. William Schenk, Jr. (Verna) of Georgetown; and two grandchildren, Diane and William Schenk.

Rev. Ian Fleming conducted the funeral service last Wednesday at the H. C. McClure Funeral Home, with interment following in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were his son-in-law William Schenk and grandson William, Dick Lipsitz, Hugh Mercer, Markdale, Dr. Hugh McCrimmon, Guelph and Dr. Donald Davison, Shelburne. A Masonic service was conducted by the local lodge on Tuesday evening.

Changing Worlds For Women Stressed At BPW Conference

Women's marriage, keeping a home and having children is another challenge listed by Mrs. Brown. She emphasized that women must extend their knowledge and take advantage of courses to implement their education to stay on speaking terms with their children.

"The continuing education of women is vitally important in a changing world," Mrs. Brown said. Reeve Nance Horwood, honorary member of Brampton Business and Professional Women's Club, welcomed delegates at the dinner Saturday night on behalf of Mayor Russel Prouse and Brampton Town Council.

Referring to women working in Brampton Reeve Horwood said that 94 women are in banks; 75 are public school teachers; 142 graduate nurses; there are women on the county council and on town council; four are members of the library board and the chief registrar is a woman.
