Want Brampton, Bramalea In Rural Peel-Halton Area

Halton County Council will ask the views of all the municipalities in the county before making up its mind about the Plunkett Report on regional government for Halton and Peel.

A special committee of deputy reeves set up to consider the report will make this recommendation to council when the council meets Tuesday.

The committee will make a subsequent report following the comments of the municipalities and from this a brief to Municipal Affairs Minister Wilfred Spooner will be prepared.

The committee plans to meet sometime in December.

The Plunkett Report, published in late September, suggested the setting up of two new level-of-government counties for Halton and Peel — a rural county consisting of townships of Nassagaweya, Esquesing,

Chinguacousy, Caledon, Albion, and Toronto Gore and the villages of Caledon East and Bolton and the towns of Georgetown, Acton and Milton.

There would also be the urban county of Mississauga in the south, consisting of the towns of Burlington, Oakville, Toronto Township, Port Credit, Streetsville, Brampton and Bramalea.

Both counties would have the powers of all the present municipalities and the county council.

From this year's (Georgetown and District) annual campaign, the YMCA-YWCA organizers gathered together a devoted band of 280 local residents to canvass Georgetown, Glen Williams, Norval, Stewarttown and Limehouse.

A special committee canvassed business, commercial and industrial establishments.

Of the \$7,288 maintenance budget required the Y has thus far received:

Glen Williams results are still to be tabulated.

Campaign chairman, Stan Milne, said that the 1968 campaign would wind-up November 30th and that anyone wishing to contribute can still do so — bring or send it to the Y office, 14 Main St. South.

Special Council Meeting To Review Plunkett Data

After a lengthy discussion a motion directing the mayor to call a meeting before November 21st to discuss the Plunkett Report, was passed unanimously on Monday.

Reeve W. Hunter first called council's attention to the report, when he stated that county council would like each municipality to answer some questions on it.

Last week the North Halton Urban board asked the town to submit their opinions to them.

"We are in the same position as we were last week with the Credit Valley Authority," said Cr. Emmerson, "they wanted a meeting and we've done nothing, now County Council wants some answers and we've done nothing."

"At present I would not say it will not benefit the town," began the mayor, "since we are the largest municipality in the proposed new county." He claimed it would not go through in its present form, and maintained the town should know what revisions might be made.

Cr. F. Harrison stressed there was a time limit. "The town of Georgetown did not contribute anything to the original hearing. We will never do anything unless we have a

special meeting to discuss it page by page," continued Cr. Harrison. "If nobody does anything the report will be adopted in its entirety," he concluded.

"Would you be in a position to say this is good for the town of Georgetown?" challenged Mayor Gibbons, "I'm not."

"Not all of it," replied Cr. Harrison, "but everyone's idea should be heard."

"All I can see in it is detrimental to anyone north of the base line," opined Cr. Hyde. "We're going to be the poor relation, who has to be subsidized. Unless we're prepared to give direction, it will go through as is," Cr. Hyde said the only good in it was area planning, which could be done by the town itself. "We're not coming into our own, if we let this go through we lose the advantage we're just gaining," he added.

"How do you reconcile those opinions with your idea of annexing Esquesing," asked the mayor.

"Unless people like you and Reeve G. Leslie give direction the Plunkett Report will be shoved down our throats," retorted Cr. Hyde.

Finally the motion directing the mayor to call the meeting was passed.

Subdivision Owner Wants Town Annex Esquesing Land

An unusual request from Morris and Son Construction, asking that the land owned by them on the 8th Line (Main St. S.) and 15th sideroad, known as the old Cromar farm, be annexed by the town, was turned over by council to the Planning Board for their consideration.

Reeve W. Hunter explained the proposed subdivision owner first asked the town to stipply water some years ago, then he asked for sewer service, which was denied. He then went to Esquesing, said Reeve Hunter, which has no sewer

service. "Now he is asking the town to annex the area. The mayor could see no advantage to the town since he claimed it would be a liability for some years.

Cr. Hyde pointed out that council was not recommending the annexation, but simply asking the Planning Board to study it. "These are all R. 1 highly assessed homes on one hundred foot lots," said Cr. Hyde, "There could be merit in it, and the costs should be investigated."

Try Asphalt Sidewalk To Escape Damage From Salt

An experimental piece of asphalt sidewalk, which can be lightened in colour to look like cement, will be laid in front of the old post office.

Cr. E. Hyde contended at Council Monday night, that it would stand up better under the heavy applications of salt needed on the hill. Originally a hand rail had been suggested but Cr. Hyde stated the price seemed too high for the present.

Cr. W. Emmerson maintained that the comparative costs of both cement and asphalt should have been shown. In reply Cr. Hyde explained that the cost of cement at this time of year, plus the tearing out of the existing sidewalk would have raised the cost to between three and four thousand dollars.

Cr. Harrison reminded council that concrete can be put in at any time of year with the proper protection. However, he conceded that the asphalt would do for an economical job. Only Cr. Emmerson opposed. Crs. W. Smith and A. Speight were absent from the meeting.

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
