

Norval District Loses Two Prominent Churchmen

Mr. McClure died on Sunday November 6 at the age of 82. He was a life long resident of the district having spent his life farming on the McClure homestead. The funeral was held at the Presbyterian Church, Norval, where he had been an elder for 40 years.

A meeting of Norval district ratepayers was held in the school on Thursday evening, November 10th to hear the report from the delegation that met with the School Board the previous evening. The delegation reported that they were informed by the school board that all grade 7 and 8 pupils in Esquesing will be attending the Stewarttown School in the future with this school especially equipped for teaching these two grades. The other schools will teach grades 1 to 6. Plans are underway to start a kindergarten next year but the plans are not yet finalized. A much needed teachers' wash room at Norval is already on order.

After hearing the School Board's troubles and their plans to accommodate the growing number of school children the delegation left the meeting with the feeling that the board is doing their best under the circumstances. They feel that Grades 7 and 8 will have advantages at a school especially equipped for them as it is impossible to put in special libraries, etc., for these grades in each separate school. This is the trend in the education system today, to separate Grades 7 and 8 from the younger children and this better prepares them for high school. Georgetown now has this system. A letter will be sent to all ratepayers who signed the petition for more rooms at Norval informing them of the plans of the school board for the future.

The fourth meeting was at Mrs. Burt's home with hats the theme. Selection and care, and the choice to complement different face types were discussed.

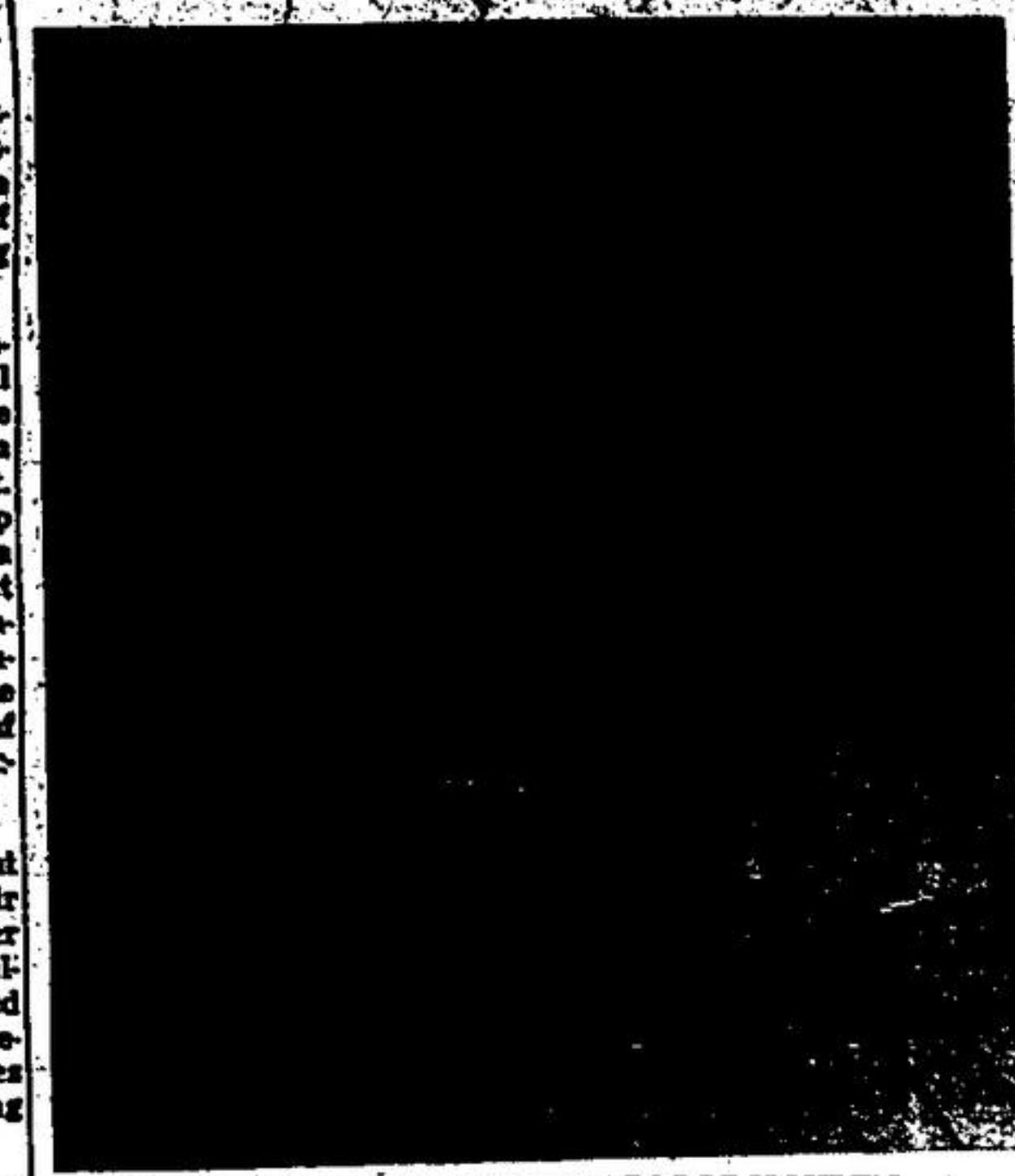
