

Five Goal Splurge Seals Raiders' Sunday Victory

Georgetown Raiders pumped in 5 unanswered goals in the third period to humble Orangeville Hornets 11-3 in an OHA Suburban Junior C League game in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday afternoon.

The undefeated Raiders vaulted into a tie with Aurora for the league driver's seat on the strength of the win which gave them a record of four wins and two ties in as many starts.

Orangeville quit scoring with a little over five minutes in the middle period. At that point it was a see-saw 4-3 hockey game.

Hay and Cummins punched in two more Raider goals before the period was out, and the pattern was set. With Orangeville leading in the third session Georgetown hit them with a five goal cannonade off the sticks of Stewart, Dwyer, Maloney, Norton and Robinson.

Don Norton pushed Raiders into a 1-0 lead from Dwyer and Brad Johnson at 5:47. But the visitors washed it out half a minute later when Watts struck from McMullen. Smooth skating Ron Stewart converted a Rod Presswood pass into the go-ahead tally at 16:55.

Watts fed Stoddard on the equalizer at 3:16 of the second period and it remained dead-

locked until Paul Robinson registered his first of a pair from Bill Dwyer. Phil Lavell, who with goalie Tom Ayres were the defensive stickmen, contributed Raiders' 4th marker, an unassisted picture play at the mid way point.

Crawley carded Orangeville's third and last counter at 15:10. Robinson passed to Hay on his scoring play at 16:39, and Johnson and Terry Lane aided Mike Cummins to score Georgetown's 6th goal at 19:34.

The third period production went like this: Stewart from Dave McMenemy and Cummins at 2:10; Dwyer from Robinson and McMenemy at 5:14; Rick Maloney from Lavell and Cummins at 9:27; Norton from Dwyer and Robinson at 11:52; and Robinson from Dwyer at 12:34.

Raiders also had the most time in the cooler with 15 penalties to Orangeville's 11. Included in sentences were five minute fighting majors to Georgetown's Johnson and Orangeville's Huddlestone who squared off with five minutes left.

Georgetown will meet the second place Oakville Blades in the Memorial Arena for the first time this season on Sunday. They met in Oakville Friday night and battled to no-decision.

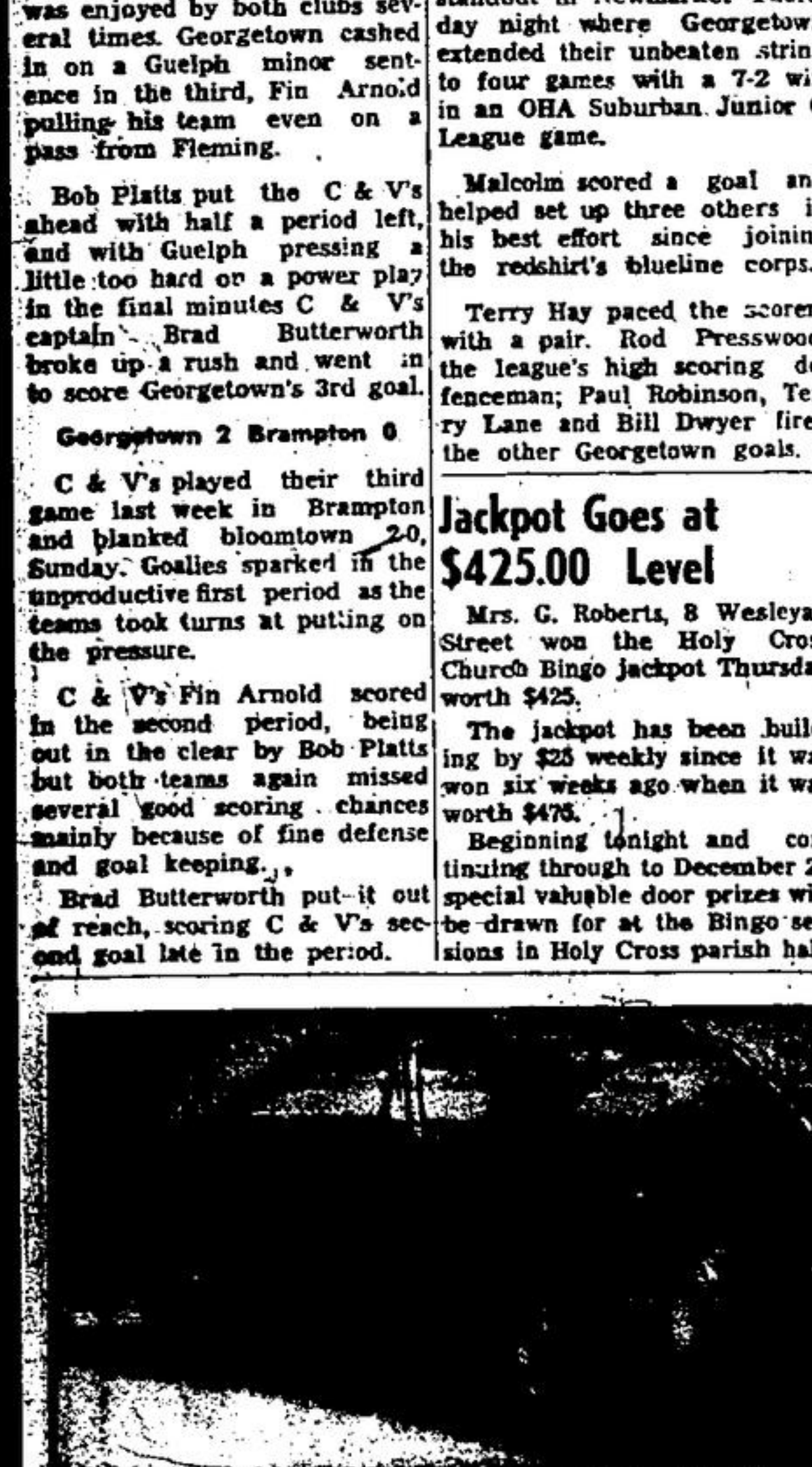
