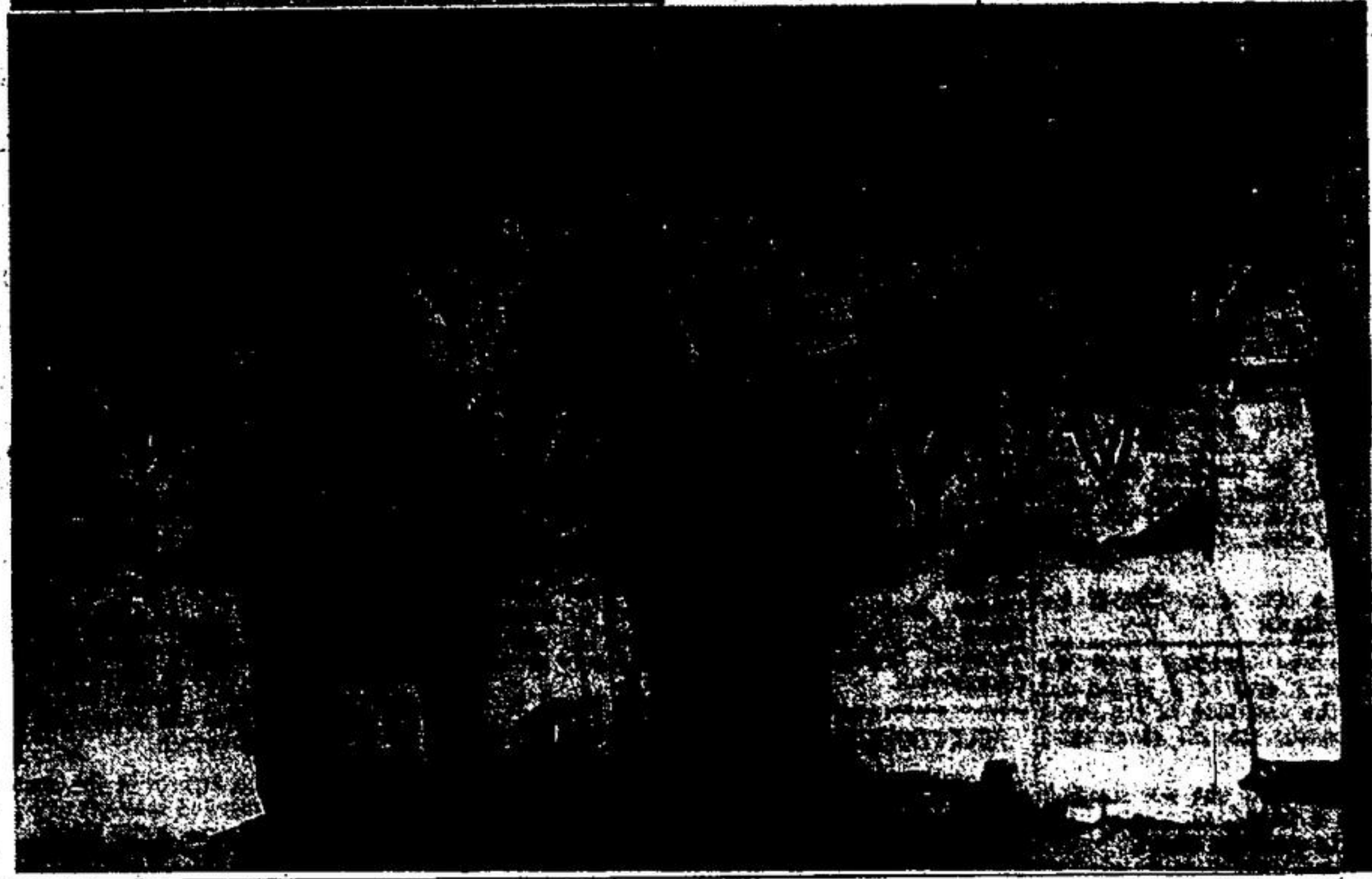


## EASTERN STAR CHAPTER INSTALLS 1967 OFFICERS

## Municipal Staff on Alert With Election Machinery

The ballot boxes have been hauled out of their year-long sleep in the basement of the municipal building, and dusted off for the December 5th municipal elections. For the first time the boxes will have a two year sleep following this election.

The blackboards, too, which each year have announced the results to the waiting crowds in the municipal building, are cleaned and set up in the water works, waiting to be transported to the Main St. building.

Twelve polling stations, distributed all over town, will employ forty-eight people for the day. Each polling station has two deputy returning officers, and two poll clerks. The deputy returning officers are paid twenty dollars, and the poll clerks seventeen dollars while the owner of the building in which the polling station is located, receives twenty dollars.

Approximately 6,100 voters are eligible to cast their bal-

lots for mayor, reeve, deputy reeve and councillors. In addition, two questions will be asked. One asks, "Are you in favour of reverting to an open vote, rather than the present ward system?" while the other asks, "Are you in favour of establishing a commission for the control and management of the water works system in the town of Georgetown?"

Following Nominations night Tuesday, the candidates had till 9 p.m. Wednesday night to qualify for candidacy. Each candidate must be over twenty one, a British subject, a householder, which means a land owner or tenant of land within the town boundary and must live within five miles of the corporation limits.

"A householder" is defined as a person who occupies and is assessed as owner or tenant of a dwelling or apartment, or part of a dwelling or apartment house, separately occupied as a dwelling. In other

words it is not necessary to own land to be a candidate.

As soon as the candidates have qualified, the ballots will be rushed to the printers.

The polls will be open from 9:30 a.m. till 7 p.m. on Monday December 5th, and an advance poll on Saturday from 10 till 5 p.m.

Cr. Harrison said he knows several men who would sit on the board, but he hadn't been asked when appointments were made.

"It's a dull job and sometimes we have trouble getting a quorum at a meeting," said Cr. Speight. "If Cr. Harrison gives me the names I'll be happy to pass them on to the chairman."

## By-Law Would Control Subdivision Lot Lines

A by-law which would control changing lot lines in subdivisions without civic approval received two readings - by council Monday.

The by-law was urged by Cr. F. Harrison after council heard a development firm representative tell them last week of plans to have more houses than originally planned on the former Moore farm. Without a part lot control by-law, a developer has no restrictions on such a change.

A councillor remarked Monday that he has heard the property has again changed hands in the past week. Cr. Hyde said council should check before final passing of the by-law, as he believes this could affect every property in town, as the whole town is part of a plan of subdivision. This could cause unnecessary delay in situations not intended to be covered by the by-law, he said.
