Charge 39, Patrol 8,943 Miles North Halton OPP's Week

North Halton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, is a general law enforcement detachment, with a staff of 36 uniformed personnel. The detachment area consists of Nassagaweya and Esqueping Townships, approximately 183 square miles with approximately 347 miles of highways.

During the past week, personnel of this detachment patrolled 8,943 miles on all highways, issued 39 traffic charges and 85 traffic warnings. Traffic warnings involved faulty equipment, minor speeding offences, improper passing and lane changing, and failure to obey highway signs and markings.

There were five property damage accidents and one personal injury accident investigated, in which one person was injured.

In addition, two impaired driving charges, five liquor offence charges and one criminal charge were preferred.

In other general occurrences, four persons were reported missing, being later located, three liquor seizures were made and twenty-one minor occurrences investigated.

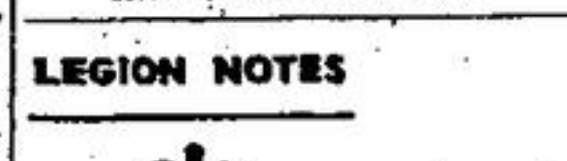
