LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

When defending against a no trump contract, your usual lead is from a long suit. You do this in order to establish tricks in that suit, since the opponents have most of the high cards. When your partner gets the lead, he should return your suit.

All this, of course, can change the minute that you see dummy. That's what makes bridge the game it is.

Human judgment is required to decide when to follow the ground rules and when to change and do something different. That is exactly what happened last week at the Acton Bridge Club. Here is the hand. The dealer was West and East-West were vulnerable.

It took several rounds of bidding to get into trouble, but when Jack Coats played three no trump, he made nine tricks. The results at other tables indicated that three no trump should be set, so I took a second look.

West is faced with a problem on the opening lead — Cards should be led through North's bid suit or up to South's suit. It is much better to lead through strength, so West opened the spade six.

Dummy plays low and it's up to East. I suppose the most spectacular play would be to take the spade ace and lead the queen, tempting declarer to win and set up a couple of spade tricks for your partner.

But this would also give de-

clarer two spade tricks and maybe that's all he needs.

This is the time to use a little human judgment. The bidding indicates that declarer doesn't have too much in the way of high cards.

The best bet is to lead up to dummy's weakness — diamonds. Declarer will win and attack either clubs or spades. In either case, the defense has time to get at least one diamond in addition to two spades and the ace and king of clubs.

If you play it safe by leading clubs or hearts or leading back a spade, there is a good chance that declarer will make three no trump as indeed happened at our table.
