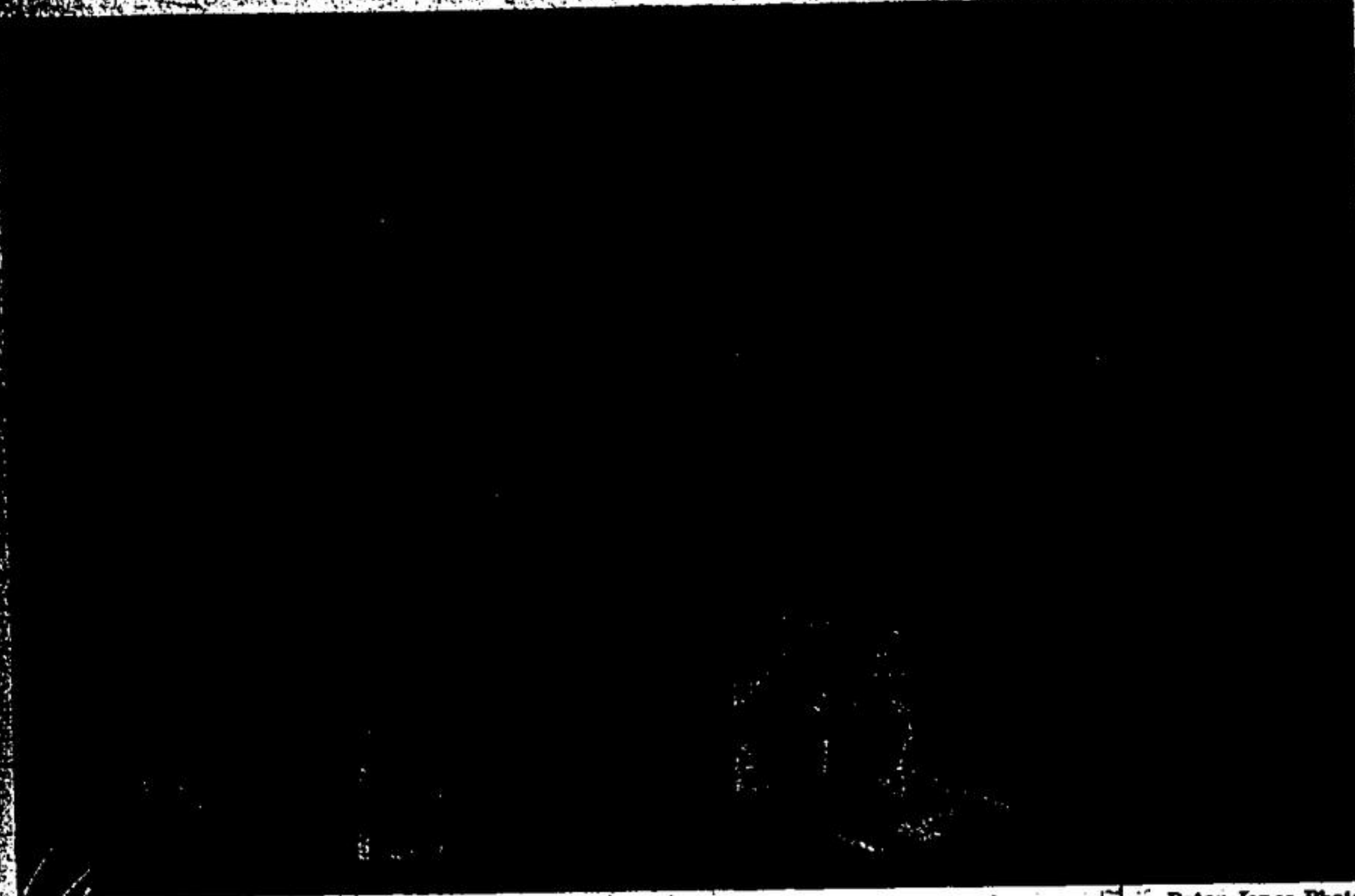

**Three Goals in Two Min. Power Play Foils Blades**

The Georgetown Raiders preserved their unbeaten streak here Sunday — but not before they got a bit of a scare.

The Oakville Blades built up a 4-1 lead in the second period before Raiders' power play pushed home 3 quick goals to earn a 5-5 tie in a Suburban Junior C hockey game.

The tie ran the Raiders' unbeaten streak to seven games although they have been held to three ties — two by Oakville.

For the Blades it was a complete reversal of the form they showed against Aurora on Friday night when they absorbed an 11-5 defeat.

Wayne Bowden scored two goals for the Blades and set up another by Bill Ferras.

Gord Armstrong and Don Desmond fired the other goal for the Blades while Roy Phillips and defenceman John Kemp drew two assists each.

Five different Georgetown players shared the Raider goals with Rick Maloney, Paul Robinson, Terry Hay, Terry Lane and Phil Lavell netting one each.

Oakville started out like they were going to skate the Raiders out of the rink.

Bowden got his first goal of the day before the game was a minute old and Armstrong combined with Kemp and Thomson for a power play goal just minutes later.

Blades continued to dominate play in the second period and after Maloney notched the Raiders' first goal Bowden rained in his second and marker and Desmond connected to run the count to 4-1.

The balance quickly shifted the other way.

The Raiders were quick to strike for three goals in less than two minutes to tie the score.

Robinson got his goal from Dwyer and Presswood at 16:45. Terry Hay deflected a waist-high shot by Phil Lavell less than a minute later, and at 18:37 Terry Lane banged in a rebound, Blair and Hay assisting, to tie the score at 4-4.

Raider power play clicked again at 12:36 when Lavell let an ice-hugger go from the point that found a corner. Lane and Presswood assisted.

Ferras earned the tie for

Oakville with less than three minutes left. ICE CHIPS — Georgetown Raiders have lost their good play-maker Ron Lane to the Waterloo University team. **Sunday Crucial Tilt Pairs Unbeaten Raiders, Tigers**

With seven games played in the OHA Suburban Junior C Hockey League schedule, Georgetown Raiders are already harbouring hopes of repeating as pennant winners — but one big hurdle blocks the road to the top: Aurora Tigers.

The first year entry has played 8 games and won all of them.

The Tigers and the Raiders are the only teams in the league still undefeated. They meet in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday afternoon in the first real crucial game of the young campaign.

Though lossless, Raiders have three ties on the record and trail the league pace setters by 4 points. Whether or not they can seriously fashion plans for a second crown hinges on whether or not they can do what up until now none of the other teams in the league have been able to do — tame the Tigers.

Aurora has two 50 goal scorers back from last year. John Gould (53) and Roy Pugh (50) are both centres and both have been drafted by pro clubs. Gould was a Tulsa pick, and Pugh a Montreal selection. Left winger Rick Halancin was another Montreal draftee.

There are two big names associated with the Tigers — Garry Carleton and Bill Forhan.

Forhan returning to the helm of a team he guided to a first place finish in a different league last year, had a playing career that took him to the old Junior A Barrie Flyers, senior A Chatham Maroons, and the American Hockey League Quebec Aces.

Carleton is the brother of Toronto Maple Leaf's rookie Wayne Carleton.

Add to that the league's no. 1 goalie is Jim Rutherford and you've got a picture of the machine Raiders are assigned to sabotage Sunday afternoon. Snowdown time is 2:30.
