Keep Police Office On Main Street Says Resident

Dear Sir:

I read with incredulity and exasperation what appears to me to be the plans of Georgetown council to move the police from the heart of Georgetown, which is of course the Main Street. You have in this area not only a major portion of the businesses and offices, but practically all of your financial institutions, services, and a great many of your professional offices.

It seems to me although a comparative newcomer to Georgetown, a ridiculous notion to move this most essential of services to the proposed location on No. 7 Highway, a true half-way house that will satisfy no one. For those who should have a distance to come, and I think of old people, women and young children who might need to talk with the police, this is a horrible location; as it has absolutely no sidewalks on that side of the highway for many blocks and indeed none on the road behind the location towards the cemetery. This corner Maple Ave.—No. 7, is one of the worst in Georgetown and will be a constant hazard for anyone using a busy office.

This will not help the plaza in the least as far as protection is concerned, and will draw away a large percentage from the old part of town. How much better it would be to purchase an old house on the Main Street or one of the side streets near of which there are a number available, and then think progressively to establishing in the future another sub-station around the Delrex Plaza. Personally, I like the first idea, where Council was going to put up a new building across from Remembrance Park. This seemed logical for everyone and the money could be realized at any time the building was no longer needed.

I hope the new council will take the interests of the people into consideration and not jam this through now that they have given themselves a two year term, without asking the voters.

Yours for a better home for "Georgetown's Finest", but in a sensible place.

Allow Plunkett Opinion to 1967 County Councillors Too

A two month extension of the present December 31st deadline for submissions regarding the Plunkett Report to the Minister of Municipal Affairs, was initially sought by the Georgetown County Council last week. However, an amended version of the request, which keeps the same submission date for 1966 councils, but allows a two month period for submissions for 1967 councils was approved by Council on a 20 to 12 vote.

A proposal for a simple two month extension was rejected when Action Deputy Reeve R.R. Parker suggested the 1966 councils had the responsibility to comment by the end of this year, but the new councillors of the coming year should also be given an opportunity.

"County Council would still want the individual municipality reports by December 12th, as scheduled," said Reeve Gallagher, "we need time to analyze them."

Nassagaweya Reeve W. Coulter urged the holding of the December 31st deadline for all. "It's only human to put something off if we don't have to do it right away," he commented. "Let's not delay this any longer."

Seriously Injured in Highway Car Crash

A Kenmore man was burned to death and Georgetown and Kenmore men seriously injured in a two-car crash on No. 7 Highway near the CPR crossing 8 miles east of Georgetown, Sunday.

Ontario provincial police identified the burned man as George Taylor, 25, of Kenmore, Ont. He was believed to be the driver of the car.

Douglas James, 16, also of Kenmore, believed to be a passenger in the car, is in poor condition in Toronto General Hospital with a broken neck and head cuts. Police said he was paralyzed from the neck down.

Driver of the second car, John Lamb Cunningham, 19, of Georgetown, was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital and then transferred to St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto. He is reported to be in fair condition.

The Taylor car caught fire in the crash. Douglas James was treated briefly in Peel Memorial Hospital and transferred to Toronto General Hospital.


