

Traffic Seminar Studies Prevention of Accidents

The prevention of traffic accidents through the alertness of drivers and pedestrians, education, road and automobile design and law enforcement — came under close study by several hundred community leaders who met in Timmins Nov. 17th.

They participated in the 3-day Timmins Road Safety Workshops, sponsored by the Ont. Dept. of Transport at the McIntyre Community Centre in Schumacher.

Participants, totalled more than 400, were from points throughout Northern Ontario.

The workshops were designed to stimulate greater community awareness of the challenge of traffic accidents and to seek means of preventing them.

"Most traffic accidents are caused by individuals, drivers and pedestrians," said Transport Minister Irwin Haskett, "and, while governments can play an important role, only individuals can effectively prevent them."

This is the 12th in a series of regional Road Safety Workshops sponsored by the Department. They have been held in communities throughout the province, from Kingston to the Lakehead.

"Schools, voluntary safety organizations, the police and individuals in all these areas have been helped by the workshops in their own safety efforts," the Minister said.

Mr. Haskett was the general chairman of the workshops. Most of the sessions took the form of panel discussions by experts, followed by question-and-answer periods. Panel members were specialists in the fields of highway, traffic and vehicle engineering, automobile insurance and traffic safety education.

Guest speakers included Dr. Arthur Secord, director of community service, and professor of speech, Brooklyn College, Brooklyn, N.Y., and Karl E. Scott, president of the Ford Motor Company of Canada Limited and of the Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' Association.

Sessions opened November 17 with a conference of representatives of women's organizations to discuss what women can do to prevent road accidents. Speakers were Mrs. Marion Vickers, past provincial safety chairman of the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario and women's editor of stations CKPR and CKPR-TV in Port Arthur; Miss Elizabeth Atkinson, director, Porcupine Public Health Unit, Timmins and Mrs. Belfa Thomas, president, the Federation of Niagara Peninsula Safety Councils, Port Robinson, Ontario.

TOWNSHIP OF ESQUESING ROAD CLOSING

Proposed by-law to authorize the closing of part of the original road allowance, known as Bernard Street in a plan of part of the Village of Limehouse in the Township of Esquesing, containing by admeasurement 0.497 acres be the same, more or less.

NOTICE IS HEREBY given that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Esquesing proposes on Thursday, the fifteenth day of December, 1966, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as it may deem advisable, to authorize the closing of that part of the original road allowance as described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the Township of Esquesing in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of part of the West Half of Lot 22 in Concession 6 in the said Twp. and more particularly known as Bernard St. as shown on a Plan of part of the Village of Limehouse in the said Township by C. J. Wheelock, P.L.S. dated 1965 and filed in the Registry Office for the said County of Halton, containing by admeasurement 0.497 Acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:

PREMISING that the South-west Limit of the West Half of said Lot 22 has a bearing of North 45 degs. - 11' West and relating all bearings herein thereto;

COMMENCING at a point in the South-west Limit of the West Half of said Lot 22 distant 1072.58 feet or less measured south-easterly along the said South-west Limit of said Lot 22 from the West Angle of the said Lot 22 to the point of commencement of the said South-west Limit of said Lot 22;

thence North 45 degs. - 11' West, along the said South-west Limit of said Lot 22, a distance of 1072.58 feet or less measured south-easterly along the said South-west Limit of said Lot 22 to the point of commencement of the said South-west Limit of said Lot 22;

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Great news for bridge players in Canada. The top pair of bridge players in North America is a couple of Canadians, Eric Murray, and Sammy Kehoe, the former from Hamilton, and the latter from Toronto, placed first in the team trials just completed.

Sixteen pairs of the top players over the last year were chosen to compete for the privilege of representing North America in the world championships. After 10 days of bridge in which they met every other pair, the Canadian pair of Murray and Kehoe emerged on top. Our congratulations to these two fine players.

This week, I am going to discuss a problem that many of you have faced. Regrettably, this problem has no easy solution. When you make a lead, you usually pick up a card that will let your partner know what you hold in the lead suit. You lead fourth best, top of a sequence, king from ace-king, king from king-queen, etc.

It's this last combination that gives us trouble. With most hands, it really doesn't matter, but every so often, it does. Here is a hand from our game last week to illustrate this point.

The dealer is West and East-West are vulnerable.

North

The bidding:
West North East South
Pass Pass 1 C 1 H
Pass 2 H 3 C 3 H

If West leads a spade or a heart, declarer can make his contract by drawing trumps, eliminating spades and putting East on the lead with a weak hand. He must get a ruff early from East and he can't hope for a diamond to West's hand and play West.

The most usual lead by West is the diamond king. If East does not ruff this, South can make his contract, losing only two clubs and one diamond. It is essential that East ruff his partner's king in order to get the contract.

What is the solution? There is a solution. Many players know it, but many do not. The solution is to lead the diamond king. Monday's winners: Bill Wadell, J. Coats were 1st pair; 2nd pair Cam Sliciall, Pat Jeffares; tied for third; Gwen Jeffares, Kay Coats; Penry, Bristol; Bty Ashley.
