1967 Licence Plates Go On Sale Today
Ontario's 1967 licence plates and vehicle permits will be available from Thursday, December 1, for passenger cars and station wagons. Transport Minister Irwin Haxell announced today. Motorcycle plates will be available by December 15th.

The plates and permits will be on sale at all licence offices throughout the province.

The 1967 plates have been specially designed to mark the observance of Canada's Centennial. They will have white lettering and numbering on a blue background and will carry the lettering "19 Ontario 67" on the top and "18 Confederation 67" on the bottom. The licence numbers will be separated by a crown, instead of a dot as in previous years.

Expiry dates for acceptant plates — and final day for getting 1967 plates — will be Tuesday, February 28. Mr. Haxell said there definitely would be no extension beyond this date.

"The three-month issuing period gives ample time for everyone to get plates," Mr. Haxell said. "For their own peace of mind, we hope more motorists will get their plates early and avoid 'last minute' lines."

For commercial vehicles and conversion units, 1967 plates will go on sale March 1 and the expiry date for current plates will be March 31. This procedure is the same as it has been for the past three years. For these vehicles, plates will continue to be available on a quarterly basis as well as for the whole year.

On and after December 1, 1966, the Uninsured Motor Vehicle Fee will be raised from \$20 to \$25.

TO THE **ELECTORS**
As one of three Candidates for Mayor, I ask you to give careful consideration to what you want in the future.
I submit that my past record of service as Mayor and this year as Finance Chairman of your sitting Council, that I have never had the opportunity of taking over without facing a deficit from the previous year, and I have never left a deficit behind me.
This year we faced a heavy loss from 1965 and I am happy to say, 1966 will end with a small surplus.
This simply means that once again your Municipal Council can enter into a New Year and be in a position to forge ahead and render the services and streets and roads and recreation and cultural facilities that are required of a progressive municipality.
These things can be done from the extra revenues we are beginning to reap from our industrial growth that has finally been set in motion and without any doubt will continue. Also from the extra monies we have been able to bring into the Municipal Treasury from other avenues, such as a revision of our building permits, etc.
I mean simply this — the future of Georgetown is brighter today than it has ever been and with careful administration we can progress and lead the way, without further demands on the Taxpayer and without increased taxation.
The most serious thing that faces us today, is the fact that all of this may be snatched away. The financial hardships we have borne these past years, because of an off-balanced assessment ratio, and the very much improved condition we are in today and the brighter future of tomorrow will all disappear if we stand by and allow the recommendations of the Plunkett Report to be legislated.
Do you realize, if this recommendation is passed, that Georgetown will disappear and will become part of an area that it has already been suggested will be so poor that it will require Government subsidy to exist. That the balance of industry we have struggled so hard to attain, will be dispersed over an area so large that the benefits will be almost negligible. We are entering into our Centennial year, the hundredth birthday of Canada. Let us make sure it is not remembered as the year of the death of Georgetown.
Fast, Hard and determined action must be taken by YOUR Municipal Council. Your Council must be united if we are to survive as the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown. If we are to protect the way of life you and I have chosen here, and the investment that you and I have financially in our town and the future of your children and my children depend — we must be united — there must be leadership — there must be determination that will not be swayed.
The immediate future is not a time for sentiment. It is a time for action.
I opposed the manner in which the Two Year Term was forced onto you, the electorates. However, you are electing a Council for 1967 and 1968. Therefore you should give double the consideration when making your choice.
I seek your support for MAYOR for the 1967-1968 term and I stand on a policy of progress in all Municipal Services.
