Nurses Will Apply For Labour Certification

Mrs. Flora Hesson, president of the Halton County Nurses Association, revealed this week that the group will apply for certification under the Ontario Labour Relations Act.

Mrs. Hesson made the announcement after representatives of the association met Thursday with a five-man county council committee.

She said the committee, headed by Warden E. H. Hinton, advised the nurses they would have to be certified before council would negotiate salary and working conditions with them.

"There is nothing else we can do," Mrs. Hesson said. "Although we would rather have proceeded on a voluntary basis."

The nurses returned to their jobs at the Halton County Health Unit early this month after walking out September 12 when they were refused the right to collective bargaining.

Mrs. Hesson said the latest committee stand was a complete reversal of what they had been led to believe before returning to their jobs.

She said the men on the

committee had a moral commitment to begin negotiations with the nurses. She said they had returned to work on three conditions — that both parties work towards collective agreement, both seek help from a neutral adviser if necessary and both begin negotiations as soon as possible.

Mrs. Hesson said the vote by the committee to ask the nurses to apply for certification was not unanimous.

"A moral commitment meant absolutely nothing to them," Mrs. Hesson said. "It's a clear lesson and we know now the type of men we're dealing with. I hope the public will take a good look."

Mr. Hinton, speaking for the council, said the decision in the end would help the nurses because had they negotiated on a voluntary basis as they wished, the decisions reached would not have committed any future council to follow them.

Mrs. Hesson said certification would take place probably sometime in December, depending on the number of articles on the Labour docket in Toronto.
