**Multiplicity of Plans
Would Replace Plunkett**

Local government officials aren't counting the days to Christmas — they're counting the days to the deadline for submission on the Plunkett Report on Regional Government, December 31.

As the day approaches, more and more are coming out in favour of new plans instead of Plunkett.

Plunkett Report, commissioned by the provincial government suggested the establishment of two vast municipalities in the Halton and Peel area.

Rural County
There would be the rural county of Halton-Peel in the north Georgetown, Milton, Bolton, Alton, Caledon, Chinguacousy and Toronto Gore, Resouing and Nassagaweya.

In the south would be the urban county of Mississauga including Burlington, Oakville, Toronto Township, Fort Credit, Streetsville, Brampton and Bramalea.

Both counties would take over the present powers and responsibilities now run by the present municipalities.

Ambitious
George Kerr, MPP for Halton thinks the Plunkett plan is too ambitious. He thinks Halton should become one administrative unit. Ultimately he would like to see a Metro-idea for the two counties.

Milton is against Plunkett.
Most members of town council would like to see a two-tier system of government.

Milton dislikes the idea that only the areas along the lake shore should develop and believes that all municipalities should develop to the limit of their services.

Milton is now drafting its submission to the department of municipal affairs on Plunkett.

Assessment Plan
One thing they would like to see introduced would be representation on an assessment rather than a population basis.

Toronto Township has introduced a revised Plunkett Plan.

The council would like to see a two-tier government with four boroughs under a senior government which would oversee many matters but which would allow the local councils to do quite a bit of the work.

On dividing up the area, Toronto Township would like to see Oakville, Burlington and

**Council Orders All
Candidates to Take
Election Signs Down**

Candidates' posters, the aftermath of all elections, will no longer be allowed to remain on display for months after the election, council decided Tuesday night.

The first motion on the subject authorized the town foreman to have all election posters removed from town property. "I think the person who puts them up should take them down," commented Reeve W. Hunter.

The mayor pointed out that he had spent the entire day taking his posters down. "It is contrary to the Hydro Act to put posters on hydro poles," said the mayor.

Cr. Harrison expressed his willingness to take the signs down. "I just wish more of them had been left up till after the elections," he added.

Reeve Hunter suggested a letter be sent to all candidates asking them to remove their posters within a certain time. "I agree," said Cr. Smith, "and that means all of us, too."

Cr. E. Hyde contended that all signs should be considered . . . Fall Fair, Bake sales, or summation signs.

Two motions resulted from the discussion. One authorizing the clerk to write each candidate for the municipal elections, telling them to remove their signs before Dec. 17th, and the other to prepare a by-law governing all advertising posters and information signs.

The proposed by-law would require a deposit before signs could be erected, which would be forfeited if the signs were not removed within so many days after the event.

Cr. R. Ballentine reminded the members that the telephone service men found all such signs hazardous.

The cold weather over the week end brought the first skating on the pond this season. Children and young people had fun on the ice but milder weather has made the ice unsafe so children should be warned against venturing on the ice after a thaw.
