

Cedarvale, Harrison Rinks Indoor Pleasure Skating

The town will maintain two indoor skating rinks this year, according to town foreman Frank Moretto.

For the first time there will be a large skating area at Cedarvale Community Centre. The 100' rink will be boarded mainly for pleasure skating. A few hours will be available to hockey players. These times will be limited and strictly enforced. Eventually it is hoped to build an artificial skating rink at Cedarvale which will be impervious to other changes.

Another rink will be constructed at Harrison Public School where the same type of regulations will apply.

Jail Too Cool Prisoner Released

Halton County's only female inmate was released Monday when it was revealed her cell was too cool.

"The court will not take the risk of a person catching a cold in the jail," Magistrate Kenneth Langdon told the woman who was jailed on remand last week after being convicted of deserting her children.

"The jail is not heated — there appears to be some trouble," said Magistrate Kenneth Langdon.

A spokesman at the jail said a thermostat was presenting the trouble.

"We have just changed over from coal heating to oil" he added. "The thermostat cuts out before the women's section in the jail heats up."

Male prisoners were reported to be more comfortable.

Says No Compulsion For Certification Of Nurses

Halton's 22 public health nurses ought to go for certification if they expect negotiations with county council over bargaining rights council decided Monday.

But a row blew up over the word "must".

Several councillors strongly objected to the inclusion of the word in a report from the warden's special committee in the dispute.

Warden Herbert Hinton claimed it was a typographical error.

He said the committee felt the nurses ought to become certified before they could be recognized as a collective bargaining unit but that it did

not say they should become certified.

Warden Hinton said there was no compulsion involved.

He also refuted Mrs. Flora Hosson's allegations that council had broken faith with the work at Halton County Health nurses after they returned to Unit a few weeks ago following a mass walk-out in September.

"There was absolutely no moral commitment at any time," he claimed.

He said the committee should not be expected to make assumption that everything would go in their favour if they returned to work.

He said the committee had made it clear from the start that the nurses were not recognized as a bargaining unit.

He said it was an opinion and not a demand that they become certified under the Labour Relations Act.

He said without it any contract that was negotiated may be set aside within a year. "We don't know the structure of the next year's council," he said.

The warden gave an assurance that when the nurses become certified council's committee would meet with them and proceed towards negotiat-

ions, he said.

"This is nothing more or less than a railroad job," retorted Georgetown Deputy Reeve J. Young.

The warden said he realized an employer had no right to demand that an employee become certified.

"The way I see it the nurses have nobody to blame but themselves," added Deputy Reeve Rogers. "They walked out."
