

High School Breezeway to Be Foyer, Display Area

The yawning interruption in the brick face of the Georgetown District High School which used to be that school's breezeway will be a gleaming foyer and display area when current construction work is completed.

The work being done in connection with the sprouting of the building's latest wing, includes closing in the front, installing glass doors, laying terrazzo floor, converting the ceiling to tile, and erecting a glass paneled rear wall.

Students who had to cross through the breezeway to change classes will gain the major benefit of the new area. As well as protection from the chilling wind in winter for those who braved the elements to take the short-cut, it will also save about 200 yards of walking for those who chose to go between the east and west sections of the school via the indoor route.

The converting of the breezeway and work on additional gym areas, with showers and change rooms, are the final stages of the construction.

The latest wing includes fourteen rooms, most of which have been in use since September.

of a cord framework covered with straw and different colours of paper and ribbon. Then it is covered with paper stars and silhouettes cut in various designs. The effect, when reflecting the firelight and the candles glow, is mysterious and fascinating.

In the churches candles are used profusely; the altars are banked and the windows are filled with them. Before dawn,

on Christmas morning, churches beckon approaching visitors with this effect, like brilliant lanterns.
