EDITORIAL COMMENT

Not the First Time

After the municipal elections, The Herald referred to the incoming council as Georgetown's first "two year council-" it isn't so.

Thanks to the memory of Mayor Gibbons, 'we must set the record straight and say that once before in the town's history, the same procedure prevailed. Mr. Gibbons' should recall it, because then, as now, he became a "two-year mayor."

It was in 1940 that a question vote asked ratepayers if they would prefer a council elected for two years. It was approved by a vote of 203, with 130 oppos-

Mr. Gibbons headed the 1941-42 council for the two years, Harold Cleave was reeve; and councillors were Sam Mackenzie, Kenneth MacDonald, James Costigan, A. E. Cripps (now of Stayner), Clifford Bradley (now of Acton) and the late Norman

The new procedure lasted only for the

two years. When elections were held again in December, 1942, they were only for one year again. Mr. Gibbons was elected mayor again that year when the reeve made an unsuccessful run against him, Mr. Brown became the new reeve, Councillors Bradley, and MacDonald were returned, and new councillors were Joseph Hall, Sr., William P. Thompson, Hedley Shaw, who lost his life on active service overseas, and the late Thomes L. Lyons.

In 1959, voters turned down a twoyear term resoundingly 1727 to 523 in a plebiscite vote.

It was adopted this year on a split 5-4 council vote, without being submitted to a ratepayers- vote.

An odd fact is that, in both cases, Mr. Gibbons is a reluctant two-year mayor, for he is a supporter of yearly elections. It will be interesting to see if the innovation lasts longer in its second time around than it did back in the forties.



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
