Mr. and Mrs. Graham are living in the Driftwood Apartments, Brampton.



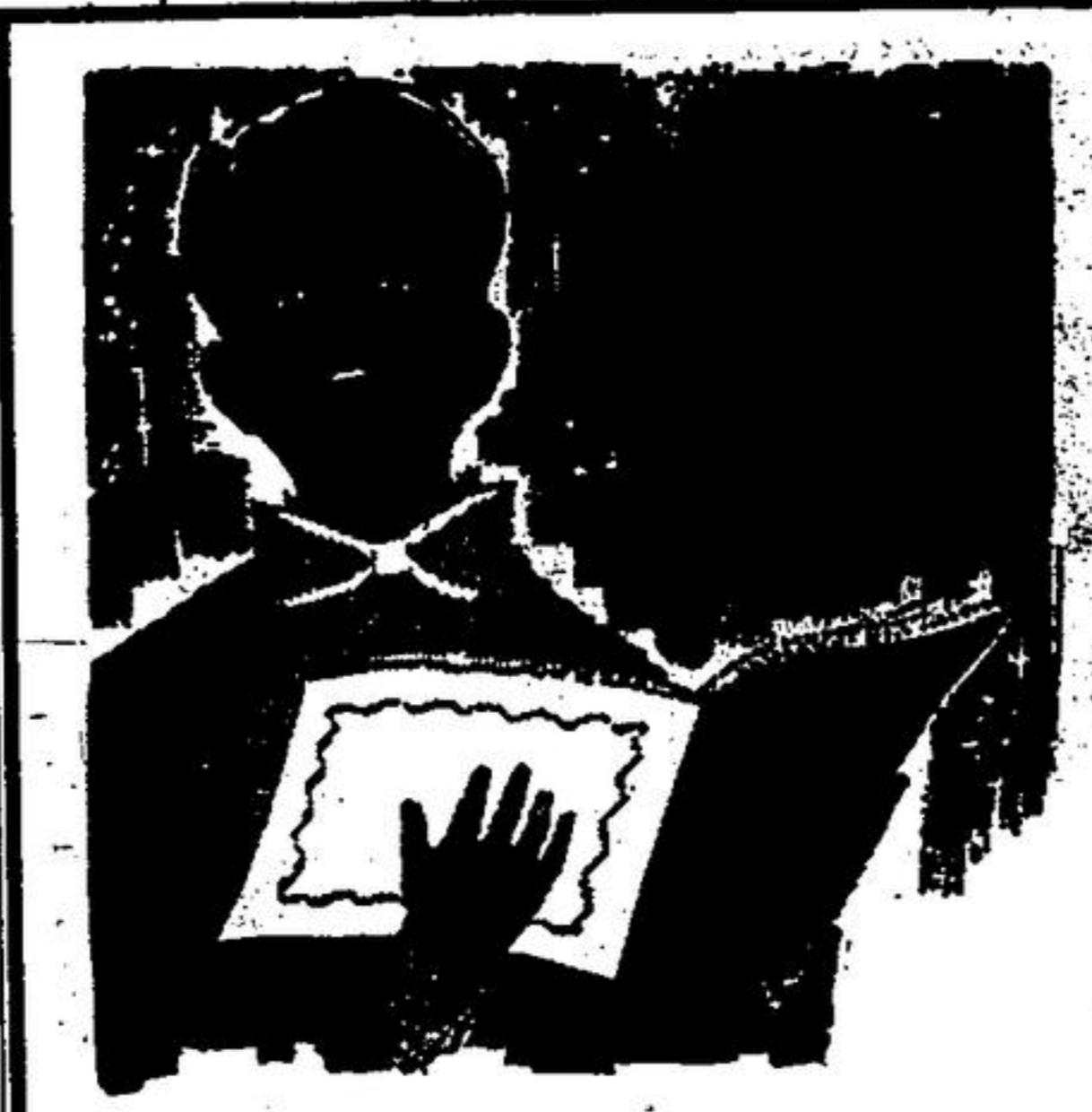
FOR YOU, DAD
