


Plum pudding is as much part of Christmas as holly an the Tree. This is one that you will enjoy making: You will enjoy eating it too.

I pound seeded raisins — half pound minced erange peel - 5 eggs - half pound brown sugar - 1 pound suet chopped fine - I teaspoon nutmeg - half teaspoon aleves - half teaspoon mace - I cup Cognac brandy - I pound currents — 1/4 pound flour — 1 pound stale broad crumbs. I teaspoon cinemmon — I teaspoon alispice — 1 teaspoon baking sade — pinch of salt and grated rind of 1 lemon.

Wash the dry currents, add raisins and mix well. All dry ingredients should be mixed together. Best the eggs and add to them the Brandy, then pour this liquid to the dry mixture and add fruit.

Pack into greased pudding mould and steam for six hours. Steam for another six hours when ready to use. Serve with Cognac or hard sauce. This will keep for weeks if kept in a cool, dry place.


