### Rural Accidents on Increase As Driving Conditions Poor

For the period December 4 to December 10, 1964, inclusive personnel of the North Halton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 841 hours and patrolled a total of 7,879 miles on highways in the area, resulting in 22 traffic charges and 31 traffic violation warnings. Warnings issued were for infractions under rules of the road and faulty equipment.

During the current week, 14 property damage and 2 personal injury accidents were investigated, resulting in 3 persons receiving injuries and approximately \$11,165 in property damage. Contributing factors in the majority of accidents were slippery roads and adverse weather conditions.

There were 30 general occurrences reported, including theft of Onan gasoline power plant, aircraft transmitter, carpenter tools and electronic radio parts — the property of Ernest Eckert, Con. 6, Nassagaweya Twp., and theft of Christmas Tree lights in the Glen Williams area. 2 persons were reported missing and later located. Remaining occurrences were of a minor nature.

There were 4 liquor seizures made, resulting in 5 charges under the Liquor Control Act. 1 person was charged with Care and Control of a Vehicle

while Ability Impaired. With the busy Holiday Season approaching, it is requested that vehicle operators exercise additional care and attention when driving.

### Gifted Georgetown Woman Anthropologist, Nurse

A private funeral service was held on Sunday, December 4 for Miss Adelaide Lash-Miller, at her residence, Glenhurst, 70 Maple Ave., W. Miss Lash-Miller died in Toronto the previous day.

She moved to Georgetown from Toronto in 1954, purchasing the former Smith & Stone "staff house".

After graduating from Bishop Strachan School, where she was awarded the Governor General's medal, Miss Lash-Miller trained as a nurse at Toronto General Hospital and received the award for the highest standing in examinations. Courses in such varied subjects as journalism, pottery, automobile engineering, textile design showed her variety of interests. She studied the art of silver making and enamelling, which she studied with Arthur Bracken, Erin silversmith.

Two things, which more than anything else fascinated her were the Orient and the history and origin of map.

For two years she travelled in Japan, China, French Indo China, Korea, Siam, the Malay States, Java, Burma, India, Ceylon and Egypt. Then she studied at the University of Toronto where she received her B.A. in anthropology and M.A. in Chinese studies. Subsequently Miss Lash-Miller worked for some time in the Chinese department of the Royal Ontario Museum.

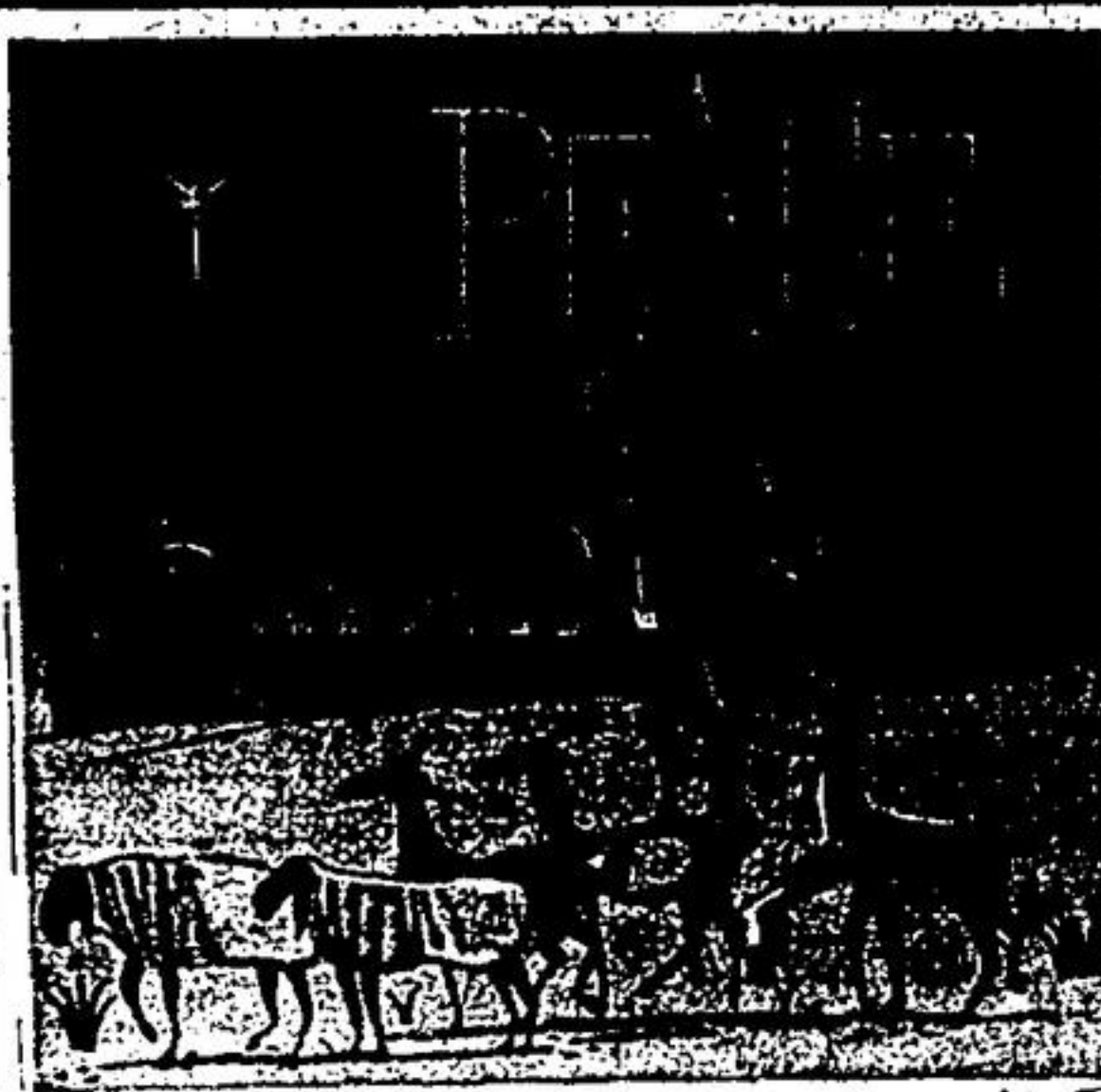
