

Georgetown Cattle Prominent November Jersey Records

Georgetown Jersey cattle were prominent in the monthly list of Jersey class leaders for November issued this week.

The highest record reported to the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club from Ottawa was that of Brownlans Kavola's Joey, a daughter of Brownlans Generation's Kavola. At 5 years 88 days, she produced in 305 days 19,283 lbs. milk, 664 lbs. fat, 4.49 per cent thereby winning both a gold medal and a Medal of Merit.

This constitutes an all time milk production record for a mature cow in 305 days on 2x milking in the Jersey Breed in Canada.

This cow is owned and was tested by Kenneth Ella and Son, Hornby.

The second highest cow in this class was Rosegate Carom's Pearl, a daughter of Campburn Markman Carom, bred and owned by Mac Alexander, Norval. Her production at 9 years, in 305 days, was 17,160 lbs., 683 lbs. fat, 3.98 per cent for a Gold Medal.

In the junior 4 year olds, Alymer Standard Mamie 285, owned by Mrs. S. L. Eva Harper, Georgetown, and a daughter of the Woodstock A.I. bull, Edgela Beacon Jester Standard, produced at 4 years, 28 days, in 305 days, 18,139 lbs. milk, 829 lbs. fat, 6.31%, a Medal of Merit, Gold and Silver Medal record. Mrs. Harper also had the second record in this class on Rosevale Lady 65 a daughter of Kinghurst Commando Advancer, that produced at 4 years, 29 days, in 305 days, 12,105 lbs. milk, 664 lbs. fat, 5.49 per cent, a Gold and Silver Medal record.

In the senior 3 year olds, A. Neilson Stark, of Georgetown, had the highest record with Starcrest Commando Betty, producing in 305 days, at 3 years, 219 days, 12,251 lbs. milk, 594 lbs. fat, 4.85%, a Silver Medal record. She is a daughter of Marlu Commando Milestone. She was followed in the same class by Mayfield Royal Belle, a daughter of Campburn Really Royal, bred and owned by R.C. Polson, Ladner, B.C. that produced at 3 years, 197 days, in 305 days, 10,032 lbs. milk, 612 lbs. fat, 6.10 per cent a Gold and Silver Medal record.

In the senior 2 year old class A. Neilson Stark again had a top in Starcrest B Betty Milestone another daughter of Marlu Commando Milestone, that produced at 2 years, 200 days, in 305 days, 10,807 lbs. milk, 608 lbs. fat, 5.63%, a Silver Medal record.

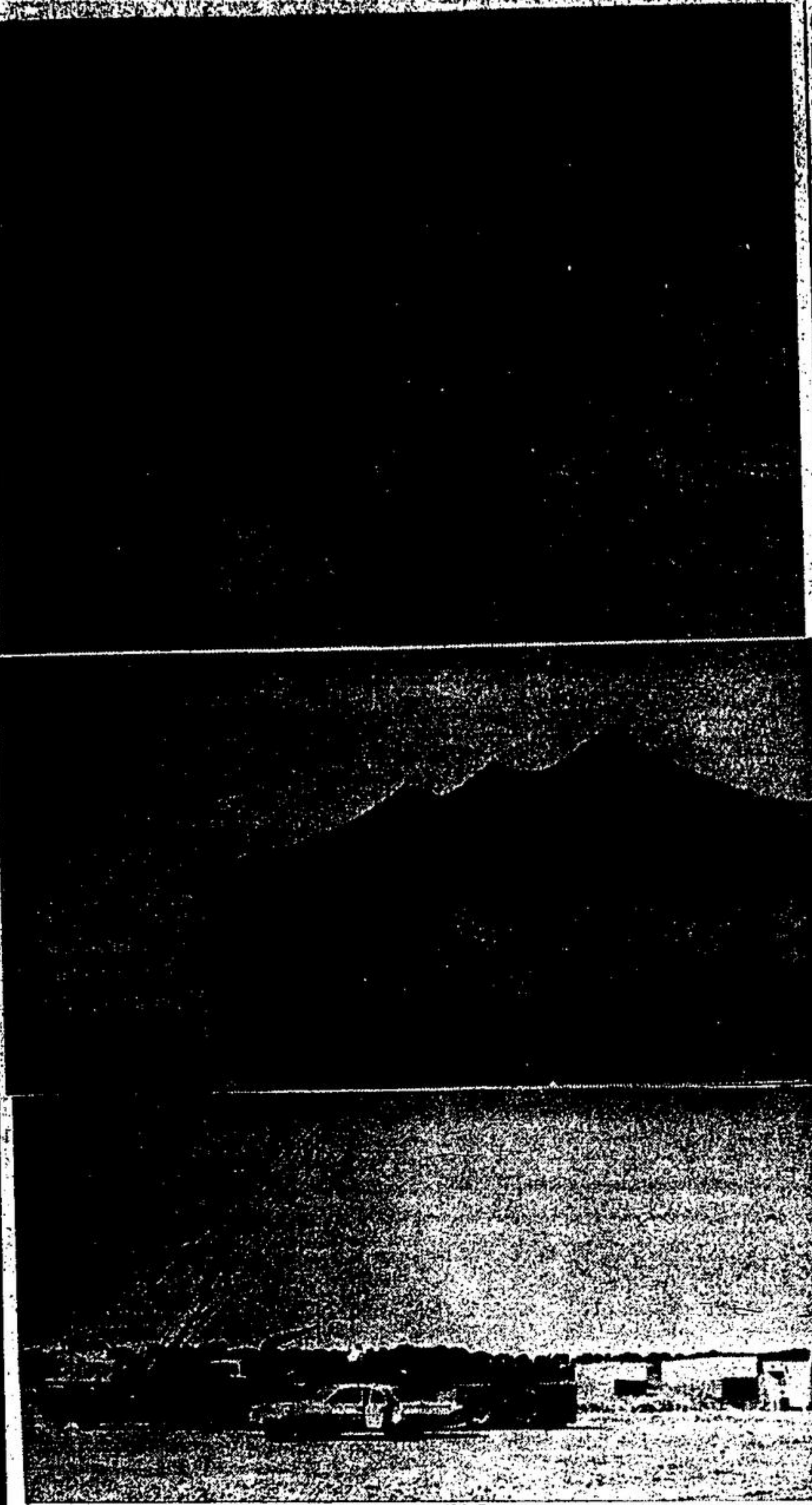
