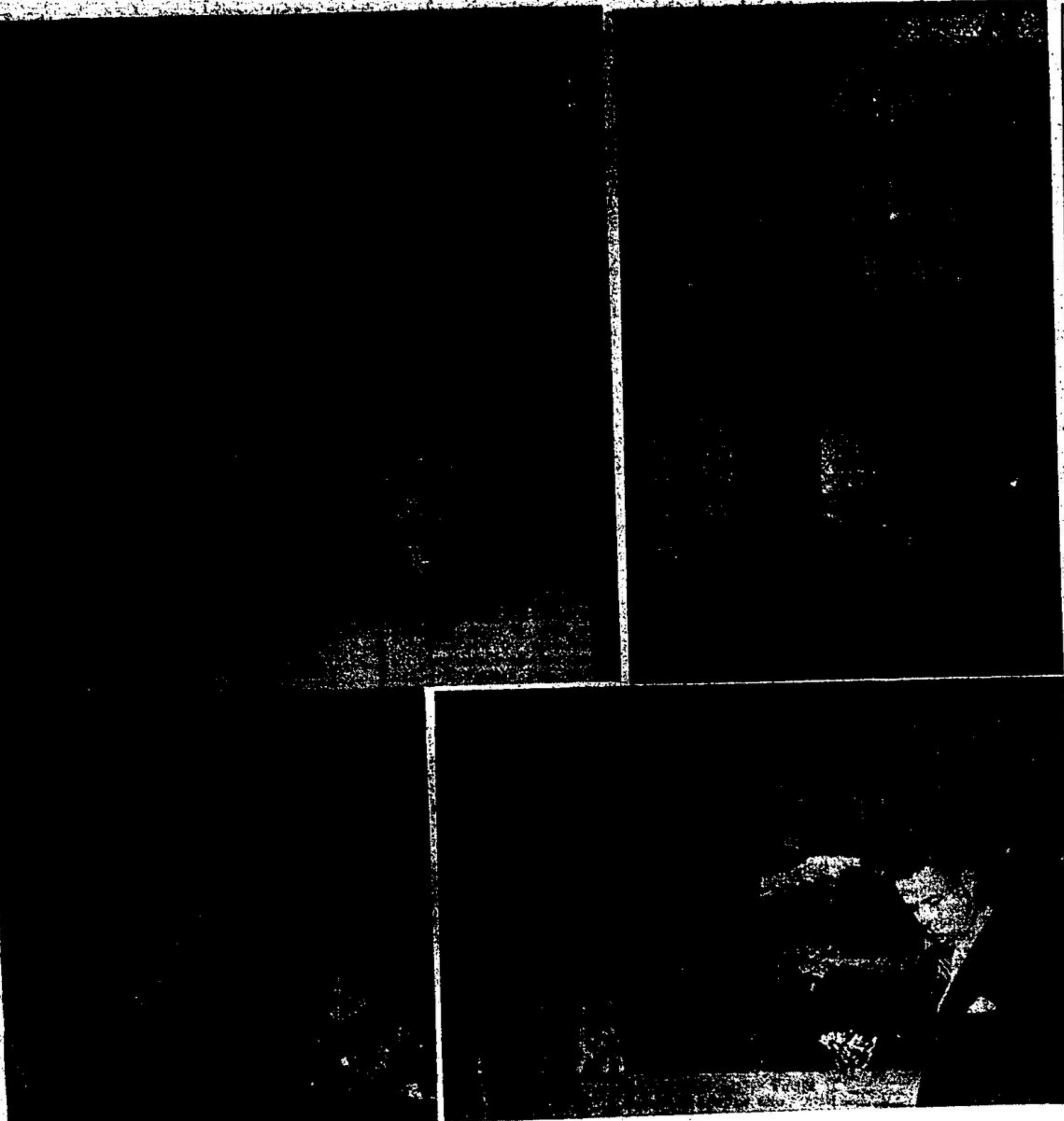

Harris' Barley is Best Yields 69.4 Bushels

Brock Harris, Milton R R 6, was the winner of the High Yield Barley Competition sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association. His acres of Herta barley planted on April 15th and harvested on July 30th averaged 69.4 bushels per acre. Thus he will be the recipient of the Gold Watch presented by the United Co-Operatives of Ontario, Halton Branch, at the annual meeting of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement on January 11th.

All seven competitors planted five or more acres of Herta barley, and others placed as follows:

- 2nd Russell Hurren, Campbellville R R 2, 64.3 bus.; 3rd, Harvey Nurse, Georgetown R R 2, 62.4 bus.; 4th Hugh Bealy, Milton R R 4, 56.5 bus.; 5th, Jack Taylor, Burlington R R 2, 42.4 bus.; 6th John Willmott, Milton R R 1, 41.1 bus.; 7th — Gordon Thompson Milton R R 2, 38.8;

Barley has been increasing considerably in acreage in Halton County, as it produces more pounds of energy per acre than

oats. 1966 was not a good grain year, because of the drought at the time the grain was heading. Thus our Barley yields in this Competition were somewhat below expectations.
