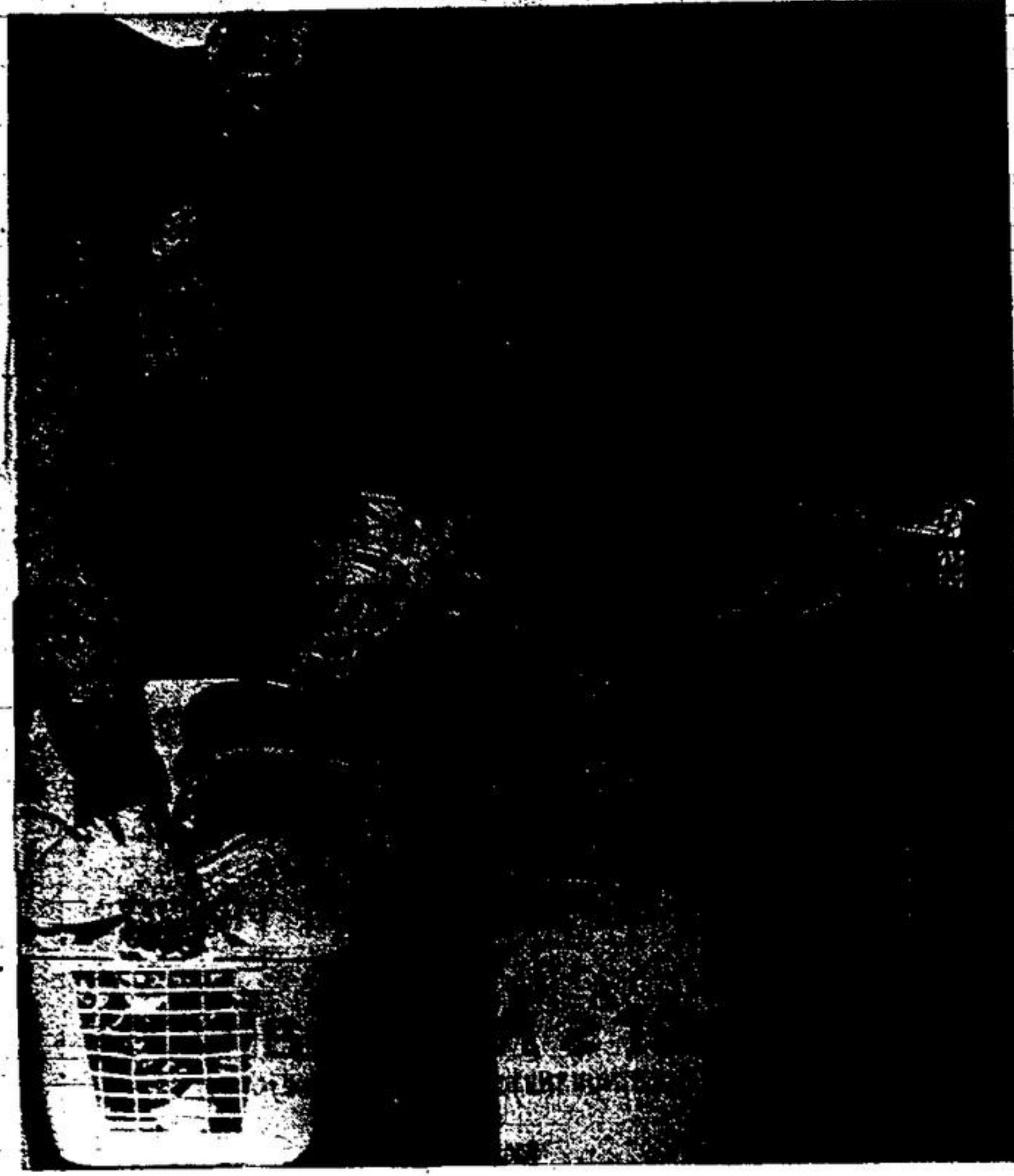


This is What A Merry Christmas Looked Like to Georgetown Families on the Welfare Roll

Pins, Brooches Presented In Abitibi Incentive Plan

Georgetown's Provincial Paper, Ltd., as a member of the Abitibi corporation, offers employees some decided advantages when their children reach the stage of continuing their education after high school.

A Student-Aid loan plan has been in effect since 1962, designed to meet the requirements of average students in need of financial assistance, whose standing is satisfactory to gain admittance to a post-secondary school. Under certain circumstances loans may even be granted for students at the secondary school level.

Loans are available to a maximum of \$1,000 a year to ensure that no child, brother or sister of an Abitibi employee is denied a university education because of a temporary lack of funds. Interest is charged at 4 1/2% with repayment through payroll deductions.

An achievement certificate is presented when a student passes the final examinations for any secondary school year with an average of 65% or higher. A seal is added to the certificate for each year the same standard is maintained. And on

Wants Better Information About Court Procedures

His Honour Judge Alan B. Sprague, Judge of the Halton County Court, called for better education regarding the laws and law courts of Canada in a statement issued to the Halton County press this week.

"I would hope that teachers and all persons charged with the great responsibility of instructing and guiding our young people will do everything possible to have these young people study and know about the laws and law courts in Canada. It should be a rewarding experience for all concerned," Judge Sprague stated.

He said it has been his practice and will continue to be, especially in this Centennial Year, to encourage all students to attend the sittings of the Courts as far as the accommodation will allow.

"Thanks to the chief judge of the county and district courts in the Province of Ontario and other judges who have assisted with the very heavy work load in this county, the cooperation of the Law Association of the County of Halton, and the efficient administrative staffs of these courts, the criminal and civil lists have been kept up to date," he said. "Time alone will tell whether we shall be able to keep these criminal and civil lists up to date when the procedure under the new Legal Aid Act comes into operation."
