Georgetown Raiders blanked Milton Merchants for the last 45 minutes of an OHA Suburban Junior C game in Milton's Brown St. barn Friday night to capture a 5-2 from the frustrated county towners. In five meetings the Raiders have beaten the Miltons 4 times after playing to a tie in their first meeting.

Friday's tilt was the last of the regular schedule for Raiders on Milton ice.
