Reminds Quarries Provide Million Dollar Payroll

Dear Sir:
Recently a letter to the Editor appeared in your paper which was written by Mr. Will Fortowsky. He especially emphasized the matter of taxes being paid by the Quarry owners. Mr. Fortowsky should know that approximately 200 employees of the quarries in the north end of Halton make a living by working in the quarries. My figure of 200 is very conservative and not by any stretch of the imagination over-emphasized. These 200 people earn approximately \$5,000 per year each which in return provides a payroll of approximately 1 Million Dollars which is entirely spent in North Halton, since these employees are residents of Milton, Georgetown and Acton. If one considers the taxes which are paid from this payroll one wonders why anyone would be so presumptuous of assuming that the quarry assessment(s) is all there is.

Besides, the purchasing power of employees of the quarries is most certainly important to the Merchants-Builders and other commercial enterprises in the north end of Halton County. The caravan of objects to the quarries is indeed growing, however, very seldom is the entire matter pursued with all factors in mind.

Since our organization the Cement, Lime and Gypsum Workers represents a number of the quarry workers in the North we felt that some consideration should also be given to these people who earn their living and support their families by working in the quarries.

It would also be wise for Mr. Fortowsky to inquire with the Quarries about Rehabilitation Plans of the Quarries especially since all of them have such plans for the beautification after removal of quarry material. Obviously the villain role for the Quarries has been designated and come hell or high water, no one will give that much consideration to them.

Progress may mean removal of some feature of pastoral living and pastoral living may not mean progress, this is the issue in our changing society. Quarry owners will have to reform to residents' wishes and residents will have to look with a bit of common sense toward the quarry operations until this is done the matter will be a feud without ending. Mr. Fortowsky's letter has done nothing to prove that this is done.

Less heresy and more facts would also improve such relationship. The \$382,000 from the Province of Ontario most certainly contains a share of the employees' taxes submitted original to the federal government, for building and improving roads leading and coming from Quarries.
