NEW CMI CANADIAN PLANT TO BE OPERATING IN 1967

Canadian Motor Industries and gas line tubing, cigarette L.L.D. is converting two existing buildings, four-way flashers, seat belts and many other components into a new Canadian plant to be in operation by mid-1967. . . . Final signing of the agreement between Canadian Motor Industries and Industrial Estates Ltd. took place Nov. 2nd before an audience of government and industrial leaders. The new agreement was signed by C.M.I. president Narufumi Yano, I.E.L.'s President Frank H. Sobey and vice president and general manager Robert Manuge. . . . Among those present for signing were Premier Robert Stanfield, members of the Provincial and Federal Governments, of the Japanese Embassy and M. Morii president of Mitsui & Co. (Canada) Ltd. . . . The agreement involves a 20 year lease on a large tract of land with renewable options covering a further 80 year period. The area covers 60 acres and includes rail, road and wharf access. . . . The larger of the buildings taken over cover 80,000 sq. feet and will be used for trim and mechanical assembly and material storage. The layout will follow the latest trend in which the space between the assembly line is used for component storage. . . . When production commences in May 1967, CMI expects to have approximately 50 production workers on the payroll. This number could swell to 100 by the time Phase 1 plant reaches its full potential of about 3500 units annually in about three years time. . . . The first Nova Scotia built Isuzu Bellett automobiles will have Canadian batteries, spark plugs, fuses, headlights, wheels and soft trim (seats, door trim panels and head lining).
