Yields have been somewhat Shortills for the holiday. discouraging. Larry Picket, RR 3, Georgetown, harvested SILVERWOOD 20 bushels per acre of Merit soybeans this year, M.M. Coles & Son, Acton, had a yield of 15 Highway Farm bushels per acre from Merit, and 10 bushels per acre with Displays Proof so bushels per acre can be obtained, it is very doubtful whether farmers can switch Soybeans.

Weed control is very critical with this crop. Linuron applied just after the soybeans were planted, gave excellent weed control on both of these farms.

A new herbicide - Treflan - controlled weeds with the exception of Ragweed, thus it cannot be recommended for any areas where Ragweed is a problem.

Soybeans also respond wel to soils of high fertility, thus they are wouldly sown in the rotation following the corn crop, where high amounts of fertilizer have been applied. You should not consider Soybeans on your farm un less you have high fertility. good weed control, and the proper harvesting equipment.


