

# Choose Lewis as Referee 2 Russian Hockey Games

One of the two mediators at the Canada - Russia hockey clash on Maple Leaf Gardens Tuesday night was a Georgetown man, Brian Lewis.

Brian, who had never worked an international hockey game until this one, told The Herald before game time that he was looking forward to officiating this one particularly because of the slight differences in international hockey rules.

"It will be a little tough to adapt to the international system, but not much," he said. "Basically the difference is that the ice surface is divided into two halves with regard to body checking. That and the auton-

atic icing, and icing calls on penalties are what an Ontario Hockey Association official has to bear in mind when stepping into an international game."

When asked whether he had any misgiving about being assigned the Canada-Russia match especially in view of criticism heaped on officials in international clashes to date, Lewis replied "I'll just call the game I see. There'll always be critics and second guessers."

Lewis worked the game with an experienced international referee Bob Nadin who briefed Lewis on rule differences.

Brian, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Erwin Lewis, 22 Nor-

mandy Blvd., was married in May and is making his home in Cooksville.

He learned Tuesday morning that he has also been assigned to co-referee the Canada Russian game in Kitchener on Thursday with Hugh McLean, another veteran of international hockey officiating.
