**Ever Present St. John Men Won't Be From Now On**

"It is with deep regret that we are forced to announce the disbanding of the St. John Ambulance Brigade group in Georgetown," Divisional Officer Fred Cooley stated in a press release to The Herald this week announcing the folding.

For four years the Georgetown group has stood by and provided medical service at various public functions and supplied first aid whenever called upon. Local hockey games, the Bantam International Tournament in particular, the fall fair, parades, rodeos, school field days, visiting circuses and carnivals, and many Scout and Guide functions have benefited from the protection provided by the Unit.

Mr. Cooley explained that during the four year period many local groups and individuals had been approached to form a completely independent St. John Ambulance Branch in Georgetown, but this met with no success.

"Since a division cannot function without a controlling committee we are forced to cease activities here," he explained.

Up until now the group has operated as an offshoot of the Acton Branch, and it's likely many of the fourteen local St. John people will continue their service in Acton. However at least one has indicated he will quit and others have considered serving with Brampton's Branch.

Well over three thousand man hours of duty have been donated to community service by the local group who, despite lack of support, still thanked "our many friends for the opportunity of serving them," in the press release.

The St. John service has not conflicted in any way with the duties of the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service with whom they have co-operated at various times. One paragraph indicated the

door is still open for a St. John Branch here. It states, "This action (disbanding) does not exclude the formation of a Branch in future. If any group or individual is interested in the formation in this worthy cause contact Mr. Cooley. We the members stand ready to serve if support can be found."

**Car Demolished in Embankment Plunge**

A car plunged down a 35 ft. embankment on the 10th Line of Esquevas near Georgetown Golf and Country Club Sunday, landing three occupants in hospital.

An OPP report said: the driver Linda Deforest of King St. Milton, suffered a possible fractured jaw; Crystal Louth of Norval sustained a back injury

and lacerated face; and Daniel O'Connell of Norval underwent injuries. Mrs. O'Connell and another passenger were not seriously hurt. Mr. O'Connell was released immediately after treatment.

The vehicle was a write-off. Police Constable Wally Jordan placed damage at \$2,500.

Only other motor vehicle accident on the Georgetown outskirts during the week occurred Friday on No. 7 Highway at Silvercreek and involved cars operated by Russell Kayes of Acton and Richard Maloney of Manfield.

Total damage was estimated at \$1,000.
