

Grand Lodge Officers Here For Masonic Installation

Last Wednesday evening January 11th, the annual installation of officers in Credit Lodge No. 219, AF & AM, GRC took place in the Masonic Temple, on Mill Street.

The fortunes of the lodge will this year be guided by a prominent local businessman, Samuel Penrice. Mr. Penrice has been active in many local organizations and served on a number of boards, as well as having been Warden of St. George's Anglican Church. He resides on Princess Anne Drive, with his wife Hilda, and son Douglas.

The meeting was an exceptionally large one with many representatives of various district masonic groups present. A large number of present and past grand lodge officers were present, including the representative of the Grand Master, the Grand Junior Warden. Many ruling and past masters were in attendance also.

A former lodge head, W. Edwin Wilson, was installing master for the ceremonies, assisted by Grand Lodge officers and a number of past masters.

A unique part of the ceremony was the presentation of the Master's apron, by an old family friend, Bro. Stan. Shimmis, of Downsview on behalf of Mr. Penrice's family. The two men have been active in the Manx Society, both holding office in this organization of former residents of the Isle of Man. Mr. Penrice is the past president of the Society in North America.

Other officers installed included the past master, Robert Lawson, who served as W.M. in 1966; William B. Hamilton, a local building contractor, is this year Senior Warden, and Douglas V. Latimer, a lawyer, who is Junior Warden.

The evening ended with remarks from a number of the visitors and a few words of thanks from the new Master.

Afterwards lunch was served, and a social hour spent.
